

1: Important Days



World Vegan Day: 01 November:-

Every year on November 1, the World Vegan Day is commemorated to encourage a lifestyle free of animal exploitation. The day aims to raise awareness about veganism's benefits to human health, animal welfare, and environmental sustainability. World Vegan Day marks the 51st anniversary of Louise Wallis' foundation of The Vegan Society in the United Kingdom. In 1944, Donald Watson coined the term "vegan" and launched the organisation. On November 1, 1994, the anniversary was declared World Vegan Day by Louise Wallis.



Karnataka Formation Day: 01 November:-

Karnataka Foundation Day, also known as Karnataka Rajyotsava, is observed every November 1st. On this day in 1956, all Kannada-speaking regions of South India combined to establish the state of Karnataka. After taking into account the need for linguistic-based states across the country, the Indian government passed the States Reorganisation Act in 1956. As a result of this act, on November 1, 1956, the Kannada-speaking regions of the Bombay Presidency, the Madras Presidency, the

princely state of Hyderabad and the old state of Mysore were merged to form a new state.



Vigilance Awareness Week 2024 Promotes Integrity in Public Service:-

Vigilance Awareness Week 2024, observed nationwide from October 28 to November 3, focuses on building a "Culture of Integrity for Nation's Prosperity." This year's theme emphasizes the importance of transparency, accountability, and ethical conduct in public service to combat corruption and foster good governance. The Central Vigilance Commissioner, Praveen Kumar Srivastava, along with Vigilance Commissioner A.S. Rajeev, is leading initiatives to raise awareness across government departments and organizations. The week includes seminars, workshops, and campaigns aimed at strengthening public trust and creating a corruption-free environment.



World Tsunami Awareness Day: 05 November:-

The Japanese named the tsunami with two characters: tsu, which means "harbour," and nami, which means "wave." The phrase originated in Japan about a

millennium ago. Every November 5th, World Tsunami Awareness Day is observed to promote awareness of the devastating effects of tsunamis as well as the need of preparedness and early warning systems. The establishment of the foundation dates back to 2015, when it was founded by Resolution 70/23 of the United Nations General Assembly. World Tsunami Awareness Day 2024 theme is "Empowering the next generation with the lessons of the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami."



International Day for Preventing the Exploitation of the Environment in War and Armed Conflict: 06 November

While Kofi Annan was in office as UN Secretary-General, the United Nations General Assembly designated November 6th as World Day for preventing environmental exploitation during war and armed conflict. The day's goals are to raise awareness about the issue and ensure that the ecosystem and environment are always preserved. According to the UN, maintaining environmental protection is an integral part of strategies for preventing conflict, maintaining peace, and fostering peace because no lasting peace is possible if the natural resources supporting and sustaining livelihoods and ecosystems are destroyed.



Infant Protection Day: 07 November:-

Infant Protection Day is an international event that raises awareness about the health and safety of newborns and young children. Throughout the twentieth century, the United States backed efforts to reduce infant mortality, improve sanitation, and provide safe drinking water. Several European countries collaborated to educate and raise awareness of Child Care Services. As newborns are always at risk of contracting diseases early, the European countries joined by America celebrated Infant Protection Day annually on November 7. The day is observed with global initiatives for child protection and welfare.




National Cancer Awareness Day (India): 07 November

National Cancer Awareness Day is observed on November 7 every year in India to raise awareness about the signs, severity, and treatment of various types of cancer. In September 2014, Dr Harsh Vardhan, India's Union Minister of Health and Family Welfare, declared National Cancer Awareness Day. More than half of cancer cases are identified in advanced stages, which can have a significant impact on survival rates. However, early detection can help in full recovery. One in 10 Indians would develop cancer in their lifetime and one in 15 will die of it, said the International Agency for Research on Cancer's (IARC) World Cancer Report released by the World Health Organization (WHO).



CV Raman Birth Anniversary: 07 November:-

CV Raman, the renowned physicist, was born in Tiruchirapalli, Tamil Nadu, on November 7, 1888. His full name is Chandrashekhara Venkata Raman. The professor was given the Nobel Prize for his study into light scattering and the discovery of the Raman effect. In 1928, he submitted an article on musical instrument theory to the 8th volume of the Handbuch der Physik. He published his work on the "Molecular Diffraction of Light" in 1922 which led to his ultimate discovery of the radiation effect on February 28, 1928, and earned him the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1930. He became the first Indian to receive a Nobel Prize.



World Radiography Day: 08 November:-


Every year on November 8, we commemorate World Radiography Day. The important day honors a historical discovery that transformed the world of healthcare and medicine. On November 8, 1895, Wilhelm Conrad Rontgen, a German mechanical engineer and physicist, formulated and distinguished electromagnetic radiation in the wavelength range known as X-rays or Rontgen rays. World Radiography Day 2024 theme is "Radiographers: Seeing the Unseen."



National Legal Services Day (India): 09 November:-

On November 9, individuals across the country will observe National Legal Services Day. This day is

extremely important because it emphasizes the value of legal aid and proper access to justice for all citizens, particularly those who are disadvantaged or disenfranchised. National Legal Services Day, established in 1995 by the Supreme Court of India, commemorates the country's dedication to ensuring that justice is a right for all individuals, regardless of financial background, caste, community, or status.



Uttarakhand Foundation Day: 09 November:-


Uttarakhand was founded on November 9, 2000, by combining various districts from the Northwestern section of Uttar Pradesh and a portion of the Himalayan Mountain range. In 2007, the state's name was officially changed from Uttaranchal to Uttarakhand. Uttarakhand has abundant natural resources, including as glaciers, rivers, lush forests, and snow-capped high peaks. The four most sacred and revered Hindu temples of Badrinath, Kedarnath, Gangotri, and Yamnotri also known as Char-dams are situated in Uttarakhand and so, are known as the 'Land of the Gods'.



World Freedom Day: 09 November:-

On November 9, people all across the world will commemorate World Freedom Day. This day is dedicated to recognizing the values of freedom, democracy, and the perseverance of those who have

fought for emancipation and basic human rights. World Freedom Day also remembers the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989, which symbolized the end of oppressive regimes, particularly in Eastern Europe, and the triumph of freedom over division and authoritarian rule. Celebrated worldwide, this day emphasizes the importance of a society where people can express their choices, make decisions, and live without fear of persecution or repression.



World Science Day for Peace and Development : 10 November :-

World Science Day for Peace and Development is marked on November 10 to emphasize the significance and relevance of science in our daily lives. This day strives to highlight the critical role that science plays in promoting peace, furthering development, and addressing global issues. The event was a beneficial outcome of the 1999 World Conference on Science in Budapest. It was considered as an opportunity to reaffirm the commitment to attaining the goals proclaimed in the Declaration on Science and the Use of Scientific Knowledge every year. For 2024, the theme for the day is "Youth at the Forefront".



World Public Transport Day: 10 November:-


The World Public Transport Day is observed on November 10 to encourage the usage of sustainable

public transportation. The purpose of this day is to emphasize the importance of accessible, efficient, and sustainable transportation infrastructures. This particular day highlights the significance transportation on our daily lives, the environment, and the global economy. To combat air pollution, more and more cities throughout the world are attempting to create sustainable public transportation networks. This year's theme is 'Connecting Communities, Reducing Emissions'.



World Immunization Day: 10 November:-

World Immunization Day, marked annually on November 10, aims to increase awareness about vaccines' critical role in preventing infectious diseases and maintaining public health. Immunization is one of the most effective and cost-effective interventions for disease control and eradication, saving millions of lives throughout the world annually. World Immunization Day is especially important in India because of the country's unique problems in reaching remote areas. Further, children, in particular, remain at significant risk because they are either unimmunized or partially immunized against vaccine-preventable diseases.



National Education Day: 11 November:-

National Education Day is marked every year in India and acts as a platform for advocating for education's transformational impact and the ongoing efforts required to make quality education available to everyone. This day commemorates the birth anniversary of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, the first education minister of independent India. Additionally, Maulana Azad was posthumously given the Bharat Ratna, India's highest civilian honour, in 1992 for his vital service. The Government of India declared November 11th National Education Day in September 2008.



World Pneumonia Day: 12 November:

World Pneumonia Day, marked annually on November 12, is dedicated to increasing awareness about pneumonia, a fatal but preventable and treatable respiratory illness. World Pneumonia Day was established in 2009 by the Global Coalition against Child Pneumonia, a group of public health organizations dedicated to raising awareness about the severity of pneumonia and the fact that it kills over 800,000 children each year. The theme for World Pneumonia Day in 2024 is "Every Breath Counts: Stop Pneumonia in Its Track."



World Kindness Day: 13 November:-

Every year on November 13th, World Kindness Day is observed to encourage and recognize acts of kindness. World Kindness Day originated in 1997, when the World Kindness Movement had its first session in Tokyo, Japan, to bring together similar associations from throughout the world. It is a day of celebration in many countries, including Australia, Canada, Nigeria, and the United Arab Emirates. It was only after 1998 that the day was laid out as a yearly event. The World Kindness Movement started in the UK in 2010, and by 2019 it had increased to 27 countries, including France (2015), the USA (2018), Australia (2012), and the UK (2010).



Children's Day (India): 14 November:-

Children's Day, also known as 'Bal Diwas', is observed annually on November 14 in India. The day is observed to honor and recognize children as the future of the country. This date also commemorates the birth anniversary of the nation's first Prime Minister, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, known for his love of children, believed that children were the nation's ultimate asset. Jawaharlal Nehru was born on 14 November 1889 in Allahabad, India. It is because of his love for children that Jawaharlal Nehru is also commonly known as 'Chacha Nehru' among kids.



World Diabetes Day: 14 November:-

Every year on November 14, World Diabetes Day (WDD) is commemorated to raise global awareness of diabetes, a chronic disease that affects millions of people throughout the world. The International Diabetes Federation (IDF) and the World Health Organization (WHO) established World Diabetes Day in 1991 in response to growing concern about diabetes as a severe health issue around the world. November 14 was chosen as the date because it commemorates the birthday of Sir Frederick Banting, one of the scientists who discovered insulin in 1921, alongside Charles Best. This year's theme is "Breaking Barriers, Bridging Gaps".




Jharkhand Foundation Day: 15 November:

November 15 is Jharkhand Foundation Day. On November 15, 2000, the Chhotanagpur area was separated from the southern half of Bihar, resulting in the formation of another state known as Jharkhand. By doing so, it became India's 28th state. It is the homeland of the tribals, who have long desired an own state. After independence, the inhabitants of Jharkhand, notably the tribal peoples, received few socioeconomic benefits. According to legend, in the 13th century, Raja Jai Singh Deo of Odisha had declared himself the ruler of Jharkhand.



National Epilepsy Day (India): 17 November:-

National Epilepsy Day is observed every year on November 17 in India to create awareness about the brain ailment and dispel stereotypes about it. Dr. Nirmal Surya founded the Epilepsy Foundation of India, which initially commemorated the day. The goal of this day was to support needy people who cannot afford epilepsy treatment, as well as to dispel myths about the disease and raise knowledge about its symptoms and care. About 70 percent of people with epilepsy are able to successfully manage epilepsy seizures with medication and certain types of surgery.



International Student's Day: 17 November:-

International Students' Day is marked annually on November 17 to highlight the importance of education for all students. International Students Day was established on November 17 to commemorate the anniversary of the Nazi raid on a Prague university in 1939. The Nazis seized almost 1,000 students and shut down the university, killing and torturing many of them. The purpose of the day is to remember these students and to spread awareness of the difficulties faced by international students.



FOR ROAD TRAFFIC VICTIMS

World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims 2024: 17 November:-

The World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims (WDR) is commemorated annually on the third Sunday in November. This year, it will be observed on November 17th. It is a global event commemorating the millions of lives lost or badly impacted by traffic accidents. In 2004, the UN Road Safety Collaboration (UNRSC) discussed establishing a global day to promote road safety, and the World Day of Remembrance was proposed. On October 26, 2005, the UN General Assembly adopted the World Day of Remembrance as an official recognition for road traffic victims and their families. The theme for this year's World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims is 'Remember. Support. Act'.



National Naturopathy Day (India): 18 November:-

Every year on November 18th, India celebrates National Naturopathy Day to promote good mental and physical health through drug-free therapies. The Ministry of AYUSH (Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homeopathy), Government of India, launched National Naturopathy Day on November 18th, 2018. Naturopathy is the oldest healthcare method that integrates modern scientific knowledge with traditional and natural treatment. Relying on nature's healing powers, naturopathy stimulates the human body's ability to heal itself. The theme for this year's Naturopathy day celebration is "Naturopathy for Healthy Aging and Longevity".



World Toilet Day: 19 November:-

World Toilet Day, observed yearly on November 19, is an official United Nations celebration aimed at boosting global awareness and action to address the pressing sanitation challenge. This day, observed since 2013, focuses on the need of secure and readily available toilet facilities as part of Sustainable Development Goal 6: Ensuring water and sanitation for all by 2030. This year's theme is 'Toilets - A Place for Peace' which emphasizes that billions of people face heightened threats to sanitation due to conflict, climate change, natural disasters, and systemic neglect.



International Men's Day: 19 November:-

International Men's Day, held on November 19, strives to increase awareness about men's health while also honoring their socioeconomic, cultural, and political achievements. According to the International Men's Day website, Dr. Jerome Teelucksingh, a history instructor at the University of the West Indies in Trinidad and Tobago, began celebrating the day in 1999. Uma Challa, a men's rights activist in India, has been instrumental in popularizing the occasion. A mother of two, Ms. Challa founded several organizations and introduced the

celebration of International Men's Day in India in 2007. The theme for 2024 is "Positive Male Role Models".



World Children's Day: 20 November:-

World Children's Day, also known as Universal Children's Day, is observed annually on November 20. World Children's Day was first founded in 1954 as Universal Children's Day, and it is now celebrated annually on November 20. On this date in 1959, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Declaration of the Rights of the Child. It also marks the date on which the United Nations General Assembly ratified the Convention on the Rights of the Child in 1989. Therefore, since 1990, World Children's Day marks the anniversary of the date when the UN General Assembly adopted both the Declaration and the Convention on children's rights. The 2024 theme for World Children's Day is "Listen to the Future".



World COPD Day 2024: 20 November:-

Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) is a severe condition that restricts airflow from the lungs, making it difficult to carry out daily tasks. Every third Wednesday in November, World COPD Day is honored. This year's COPD Awareness Day will take place on November 20. The first World COPD event took place in

2002. According to some statistics, approximately 20 to 25% of smokers will acquire COPD. Even in times of COVID, COPD also remains a leading cause of death across the world. The World COPD Day 2024 theme is "Know Your Lung Function".



World Fisheries Day 2024: Highlighting Sustainable Practices:-

World Fisheries Day, celebrated on November 21, brought global attention to the importance of sustainable fishing practices in preserving marine ecosystems and securing food supplies. Events across the world focused on issues like overfishing, pollution, and habitat destruction, with particular emphasis on sustainable aquaculture. In India, the day was marked by the launch of new policies to support fisherfolk, including subsidies for eco-friendly fishing gear and incentives for adopting modern techniques. Experts highlighted the critical role of fisheries in ensuring biodiversity and providing livelihoods to millions



Lachit Diwas: 24 November:-

On November 24, people all around the country will commemorate Lachit Diwas, a day of great significance that celebrates the legacy of Lachit Borphukan, the renowned Ahom general of Assam. Lachit Borphukan,

known for his bravery, leadership, and patriotism, played a vital role in the historic Battle of Saraighat in 1671, which was a source of tremendous pride and inspiration for all Indians. Lachit Diwas commemorates his extraordinary contributions in defending Assam from the advancing Mughal forces under Aurangzeb.



Shaheedi Diwas of Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji: 24 November

On November 24, people across the country will commemorate Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji's Shaheedi Diwas, a day of great significance. This day honors the ninth Sikh Guru, who served as a symbol of courage, faith, and humanity. Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji willingly devoted his life to protect people's rights to follow their religion without fear. By defending Sikhs, Hindus, and others facing religious persecution, he became a symbol of antityranny sentiment. In 1675, Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji's martyrdom at Chandni Chowk in Delhi marked a profound act of defiance, inspiring countless individuals to stand for justice and equality.



International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women: 25 November:-


Every year, November 25 is marked as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. On

December 20, 1993, the General Assembly passed the Declaration on the Elimination of Violence Against Women, setting the way for the global eradication of violence against women and girls. Furthermore, on February 7, 2000, November 25 was declared the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. This step also became an invitation for governments, international organizations as well as NGOs to join together and organize activities designed to raise public awareness of the issue every year on this date.



National Milk Day: 26 November:-

National Milk Day, held on November 26th, commemorates the birth of Dr. Verghese Kurien, the innovator behind India's White Revolution. The day recognizes the importance of milk in human nutrition and encourages awareness of its health benefits. Dr Kurien has helped to establish the groundwork for democratic enterprises at the grassroots. He felt that by putting technology and expert management in the hands of farmers, the standard of living for millions of our poorest citizens could be raised. He helped India to emerge as the largest milk producer in the world.



Constitution Day of India: 26 November:-

Every year on November 26, India commemorates Constitution Day, also known as Samvidhan Divas, to commemorate the adoption of the Indian Constitution by the Constituent Assembly in 1949. The Government of India declared November 26 as Constitution Day in 2015 to promote "constitutional values among residents". The day was designated in the year of Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar's 125th birth anniversary, while he served as head of the Constitution Drafting Committee. Earlier, this day was celebrated as Law Day.



World Sustainable Transport Day: 26 November:-

In 2023, the United Nations General Assembly proclaimed November 26 as World Sustainable Transport Day, a significant step toward promoting sustainable and ecologically friendly transportation. This resolution emphasizes the importance of transportation in connectivity, trade, economic growth, and employment, while also recognizing its considerable contribution to greenhouse gas emissions. The pursuit of sustainable transport is not only an environmental imperative but a key strategy for achieving broader sustainable development goals.



Red Planet Day: 28 November:-

On November 28, Red Planet Day commemorates the 1964 NASA launch of Mariner 4, the first spacecraft that touched down on Mars. After nearly eight months of travel, the spacecraft conducted a flyby of the red planet on July 14, 1965. Red world Day is an excellent opportunity to learn more about our neighbouring world. The first person to view Mars through a telescope was Galileo Galilei. The planet's name, which is connected to its red appearance, derives from the Roman deity.



International Day of Solidarity with Palestine People: 29 November:-

Every year on November 29, the International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People commemorates the anniversary of the Partition Plan, also known as Resolution 181 (II), which sought to establish an Arab State and a Jewish State. In 1977, the General Assembly established November 29 as International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People (resolution 32/40B). On that day, in 1947, the Assembly adopted the resolution on the partition of Palestine (resolution 181 (II)), United Nations mentioned.




International Jaguar Day: 29 November:-

International Jaguar Day is observed yearly on November 29 to promote awareness about the significance of

jaguar conservation. Jaguars are the Americas' largest wild cats, and they play a vital role in the ecology. The origins of International Jaguar Day may be traced back to the mid-twentieth century, when the jaguar population was rapidly declining owing to habitat degradation and widespread poaching. In 2018, International Jaguar Day

was conceived by Panthera, the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS), and the World Wildlife Fund (WWF), in collaboration with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the Global Environment Facility (GEF).

2: Agreements



Indian Railways Renews MoU with Switzerland for Advanced Infrastructure Modernization:-

The Railways has reaffirmed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the Swiss Confederation's Federal Department of Environment, Transport, Energy, and Communications (DETEC) to strengthen technical collaboration between the two countries, according to an official release. Union Railways Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw, speaking at the MoU signing ceremony, stated that it will provide a comprehensive framework for collaboration with the Indian Railways in a variety of areas, including technology sharing, track maintenance, management, and construction, according to a statement issued by the ministry.



India signs agreement to establish BIMSTEC Energy Centre in Bengaluru:-

Jaideep Mazumder, Secretary (East) of the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), and Indramani Pandey, Secretary General of BIMSTEC (Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic Cooperation), have signed an agreement to build the BIMSTEC Energy Centre in Bangalore, Karnataka. Earlier, on September 28, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar underlined India's commitment to deepening ties with BIMSTEC at a meeting of foreign ministers. He said that this commitment aligns with India's Neighbourhood First Policy, Vision SAGAR, and Act East Policy.



RRP Electronics signs MoU with AMB, Taiwan for supply of memory modules:-

RRP Electronics Ltd., a semiconductor company, said that it has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with AMB, Taiwan, to collaborate on memory modules such as SPI Nand, Microsd, Emmc, and Ssd, with an initial manufacturing budget of \$25 million. The technology, which has increased capacities starting at 2GB, includes entire package structure details, substrate designs, test program creation, and supporting tool design, according

to the business. Rajendra Chodankar, Chairman, RRP Electronics Ltd said, "This association which will be deployed immediately at our OSAT facility will have these parts being supplied to Samsung and many leading corporates."



FICCI, GDAI sign MoU to bolster India's video gaming industry:-

The Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) and the Game Developers Association of India (GDAI) inked a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) at the Indian Game Developers Conference (IGDC) in 2024. The partnership's goal is to accelerate growth, foster innovation, and improve talent development in India's rapidly expanding video game industry. This MoU represents a significant milestone in creating a robust video gaming ecosystem in India, setting the stage for the industry's next wave of growth and international recognition.





NASA Partners with Microsoft to Simplify Access to Earth Science Data:-

Microsoft and NASA have cooperated to create Earth Copilot, a sophisticated Al-powered tool that simplifies access to NASA's massive Earth scientific data. Earth Copilot, which uses Microsoft's Azure cloud platform and natural language processing, enables users to engage with over 100 petabytes of satellite imagery and geospatial data through plain language queries. This innovative platform eliminates technical barriers, making it easier for scientists, educators, policymakers, and the public to analyse and interpret complex data.



Tata Power Secures \$4.25 Billion Deal with ADB:-

Tata Power signed a historic Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Asian Development Bank (ADB) for \$4.25 billion in funding. This agreement focuses on advancing clean energy initiatives, including solar and wind power projects. The collaboration underscores India's commitment to renewable energy and reducing carbon emissions, contributing to global climate change mitigation efforts. Tata Power aims to leverage this funding to expand its sustainable energy portfolio and drive economic growth.



UK and India to Relaunch FTA Talks in Early 2025: Strengthening Bilateral Ties:-

The Free Trade Agreement negotiations with India, which are projected to dramatically expand the estimated GBP 42 billion bilateral economic partnership each year, will resume early in the new year, Prime Minister Keir Starmer has told the UK Parliament in

London. It came during his statement updating the House of Commons on his G20 Summit visit to Brazil, when he said he had a "good discussion" with Prime Minister Narendra Modi and other international leaders. The meeting earlier this week had led to both countries agreeing to resume the election-stalled Free Trade Agreement (FTA) talks.



Health Ministry inks MoU to provide funding, technical support to IMS at BHU:-

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Banaras Hindu University (BHU) and the Ministry of Education to offer additional financing and technical support to BHU's Institute of Medical Sciences. Health Minister JP Nadda and Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan attended the signing ceremony here, according to a Health Ministry statement. The Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) facilitates the provision of grants-in-aid to IMS, similar to the funding model for the new All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) being set up under the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY).



Next round of India-Asean trade agreement review talks in February :-

The next round of talks for the review meeting of the India-Asean free trade agreement in goods will take place in February next year, according to an official statement issued on November 23, 2024. The fourth round of negotiations ended this month in New Delhi. The Commerce Ministry stated that reviewing AITIGA (Asean India Trade in Goods Agreement) will be a step forward in improving long-term trade with the ASEAN area. Asean as a group is one of the major trade partners of India with about 11% share in India's global trade.

He also has had stints with Interpol and the

United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, investigating sports corruption matters and overseeing prosecutions under the Prevention of Offences relating to the Sports Act.

"Agarwal is a second-generation leader of the USD 3.1 billion diversified business conglomerate Emami Group," FICCI said.



Justice Sanjiv Khanna Sworn in as 51st Chief Justice of India:-

Mahesh Kumar Khichi, an Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) candidate, was chosen as Delhi's new mayor and has stated that keeping the national capital clean will be his top priority. Khichi, an AAP councillor from Karol Bagh's Dev Nagar ward, defeated BJP candidate Kishan Lal (Shakurpur ward) by a margin of three votes. Khichi received 133 votes out of a total of 265 ballots, while Lal received 130, with two votes deemed invalid. Earlier, BJP councillor and former East Delhi mayor Satya Sharma was reappointed as the presiding officer by Lieutenant Governor VK Saxena.



Government Appoints K Sanjay Murthy as Next CAG:-

The government announced that K Sanjay Murthy will be the next Comptroller and Auditor General of India. 
FSIB Recommends Binod Kumar as MD & CEO of Indian Bank :-

British Writer Samantha Harvey Wins Booker Prize for Fiction:-



SEBI Proposes Reforms to Enhance Flexibility and Protection for REITs and InvITs :-

Sebi, the market regulator, has recommended allowing Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs), Small and Medium REITs (SM REITs), and Infrastructure Investment Trusts (InvITs) to hedge their risk with interest rate futures. Furthermore, Sebi has proposed allowing fixed deposits to be treated as equivalent to cash when estimating leverage for REITs and InvITs, clarifying credit rating

requirements for REIT and InvIT borrowings, and establishing a timeline for filling board vacancies and expanding the asset base for REITs and SM REITs. The regulator has also proposed to permit REITs to invest in liquid mutual funds.



Finance Minister Launches Union Bank's Nari Shakti Branches to Empower Women Entrepreneurs:-

Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman virtually inaugurated five Nari Shakti branches of Union Bank of India in Bengaluru. Now, the bank will not charge if the payment is made directly to a school, college, or any international payment using a credit card. But if the payment is made by any unofficial or third-party gateway, the bank will charge.



State Bank of India Raises \$500 Million via Five-Year Bonds:-

State Bank of India (SBI) has completed the issue of \$500 million in senior unsecured fixed-rate notes expiring in five years with a yield of 5.125% payable semi-annually. The bonds, issued under Regulation-S, will be listed on the Singapore Stock Exchange and the India International Exchange in GIFT City, with settlement slated for November 25, according to the lender's regulatory filing. The issuance, executed through SBI's London branch, will help the lender to support funding requirements for its international branches and operations.



HDFC Bank Rolls Out 'Green Loans' to Promote Sustainability:-

In a move aimed at fostering eco-conscious business practices, HDFC Bank launched a "Green Loans" initiative specifically tailored for small and medium enterprises (SMEs). 
Sustainability Report (BRSR) using the PCAF Standard, a globally accepted methodology.



French translation of Kiran Bedi's 'Fearless Governance' released :-


The Department of Management Studies, in collaboration with the Department of French at

GSL Unveils Two Indigenous Fast Patrol Vessels for Coast Guard:-

The Indian Coast Guard (ICG) commissioned two Fast Patrol Vessels (FPVs), 'Adamya' and 'Akshar', manufactured by Goa Shipyard Ltd. (GSL) and featuring more than 60% indigenous content. According to a press release, "These advanced FPVs will help ICG protect offshore assets and island territories, with their primary role of protection, monitoring, control and surveillance." The vessels are part of a contract inked with GSL to build eight such FPVs for Rs 473 crore. For the first time the two vessels were launched simultaneously utilising the state-of-art Ship Lift System.



Exercise 'Garud Shakti' Begins in Indonesia:-

The 9th edition of 'Garud Shakti,' a joint military exercise between India and Indonesia, has commenced in Jakarta. This year's exercise includes 25 personnel from the Indian Army who are participating alongside Indonesian forces in an intensive two-week training program. 'Garud Shakti' focuses on enhancing tactical and strategic coordination between the two armies and aims to boost interoperability in areas such as counter-terrorism and jungle warfare. The exercise is seen as a crucial step in strengthening defense ties between India and Indonesia, contributing to regional security and mutual trust in the Indo-Pacific region.



Exercise VAJRA PRAHAR Commences in Idaho, USA:-

The 15th edition of the India-US joint Special Forces Exercise, VAJRA PRAHAR, has begun at the Orchard Combat Training Centre in Idaho, USA. This annual exercise, held between the Indian and American special forces, is designed to enhance interoperability, skill-sharing, and coordination in areas such as hostage rescue, counter-terrorism, and reconnaissance. Scheduled from November 2 to November 22, VAJRA PRAHAR is a testament to the strong defense

cooperation between India and the United States, fostering a mutual commitment to maintaining global peace and security in response to emerging security threats.



Indian Navy Hosts 3rd Mahasagar Summit on Maritime Security:-

Indian Navy Chief Admiral Dinesh Kumar Tripathi met virtually with the heads of navies and maritime agencies, as well as senior leadership from several Indian Ocean Region (IOR) littorals, to discuss prospects for training collaboration to address common maritime security problems. His interaction with representatives of Bangladesh, Comoros, Kenya, Madagascar, Maldives, Mauritius, Mozambique, Seychelles, Sri Lanka and Tanzania was hosted as part of the third edition of the high-level virtual interaction 'MAHASAGAR', according to a spokesperson of the Indian Navy.



President Murmu Witnesses Naval Operations Aboard INS Vikrant:-

President Droupadi Murmu sailed onboard the indigenous aircraft carrier INS Vikrant, where she witnessed a series of advanced operational demonstrations by the Indian Navy. This was her very first visit to Indian Navy ships at sea. When President

Murmu arrived at INS Hansa, the Naval Air Station in Goa, she was greeted by Admiral Dinesh K Tripathi, Chief of the Naval Staff, and Vice Admiral Sanjay J Singh, Flag Officer Commanding-in-Chief of the Western Naval Command. Embarking on INS Vikrant along with 15 frontline warships and submarines stationed off Goa's coast, the President received a detailed briefing on the Navy's strategic operations.



India Begins 'Poorvi Prahaar' Tri-Services Drill :-

Following the pullout of Indian and Chinese soldiers in eastern Ladakh, India held a large tri-services military exercise called 'Poorvi Prahaar' on November 8. The 10-day exercise will bring together elements from the Indian Army, Navy, and Air Force, demonstrating cooperation and battle readiness. According to sources, the Army will deploy its units, artillery Guns, Light Combat Helicopters (LCH), and Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs). Air Force's air bases in Kolkata, Hashimara, Paanagarh, and Kalaikunda will be activated during the exercise.



Third India-Australia Joint Military Exercise Austrahind

The 3rd edition of the India-Australia joint military exercise, AUSTRAHIND, began on November 8 at the Foreign Training Node of Pune. The exercise, which runs till November 21, is part of an ongoing collaboration to

boost military ties and interoperability between the two nations' armed services. AUSTRAHIND, which began in 2022 in Rajasthan, has evolved into a yearly occasion that alternates between India and Australia. The exercise will proceed in two phases: combat conditioning and tactical training, followed by a validation phase.



India Launches First Space Defense Exercise Antariksha Abhyas – 2024 :-

The Defence Space Agency is hosting India's first space exercise, 'Antariksha Abhyas - 2024'. According to the Ministry of Defence, the 'Antariksha Abhyas' exercise will last three days. "It is being conducted by the Defence Space Agency of Headquarters Integrated Defence Staff from 11 to 13 November," stated a ministry spokesperson. It went on to say that 'Exercise Antariksha Abhyas' is the first of its kind and is expected to help secure national strategic objectives in space while also integrating India's space prowess into military operations.



7th Annual India-Sri Lanka Coast Guard Meet :-

The 7th Annual High-Level Meeting (HLM) between the Indian Coast Guard (ICG) and the Sri Lanka Coast Guard (SLCG) took place in Colombo, Sri Lanka, and marked a significant milestone in the two countries' collaborative efforts to combat transnational maritime crime and

promote regional cooperation. This yearly meeting was followed by institutionalised methods defined in the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed by the maritime agencies in May 2018. The 8th annual ICG-SLCG meeting will be hosted by the Indian Coast Guard in the year 2025.



India signs deal with Russia for advanced Pantsir variants to boost air defence:-

Bharat Dynamics Limited (BDL) stated that it has inked a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Russia's Rosoboronexport (ROE) to work together on the Pantsir air defense missile and cannon systems. BDL's Chairman and Managing Director, A Madhavarao (Retd), and Kovalenko German, Deputy Director General of the Naval Department at ROE, inked the agreement during the 5th India-Russia Inter-Governmental Commission (IRIGC) subgroup meeting in Goa. The Pantsir-S1 system is a mobile, short-range air defence system equipped with both missile and gun capabilities.



Sea Vigil 24 Successfully Concludes:-

The fourth edition of Sea Vigil, India's largest coastal defense exercise, concluded on November 21, 2024. Spanning the nation's 7,500-km coastline, the exercise involved multiple stakeholders, including the Indian Navy, Coast Guard, and state governments. It simulated

scenarios of coastal threats, evaluated maritime security measures, and tested the synergy between various agencies.



Coast Guard Conducting 'SAREX 24' in Kochi from Nov 27-30:-

According to a news release, the Indian Cast Guard is holding the National Maritime Search and Rescue Exercises & Workshop (SAREX-24) in Kochi from November 27 to 30 under the auspices of the NMSAR Board. The purpose of this workshop is to validate the National M-SAR construct using a "collaborative" and "all-inclusive" approach. The theme of the exercise will be "Enhancing Search and Rescue capabilities through Regional collaboration" to signify ICG's commitment and resolute to provide succor during large scale contingencies regardless of location.

8: Economy



Jio Financial and BlackRock Form Joint Ventures for Mutual Funds:-

Jio Financial Services and BlackRock Inc. have announced the formation of two joint ventures — Jio BlackRock Asset Management Private Limited and Jio BlackRock Trustee Private Limited — to break into India's mutual fund sector, after in-principle approval for both businesses. Jio Financial has invested Rs 82.9 crore for a 50% share in both entities, including Rs 82.5 crore for Jio BlackRock Asset Management and Rs 40 lakh for Jio BlackRock Trustee. In July 2023, Reliance Group's Jio Financial Services (JFS) and BlackRock announced the creation of a 50:50 joint venture — Jio BlackRock.



SBI Mutual Fund Surpasses ₹10 Lakh Crore AUM :-

SBI Mutual Fund's average AUM increased by 11% to ₹10.99 lakh crore in the September quarter, powered by NFOs and a robust market rally, making it the only fund house to surpass ₹10 lakh crore. ICICI Mutual Fund and HDFC Mutual Fund trailed at ₹8.41 lakh crore and ₹7.59 lakh crore, respectively. Thanks to the robust collection through new fund offers and steady market rally, the average asset under management of the country's largest fund house, SBI Mutual Fund, jumped 11 per cent in the September quarter to ₹10.99 lakh crore, up from ₹9.88 lakh crore in the June quarter.



Tata Power Invests Rs 550 Crore in Renewable Energy for Noida International Airport :-

Tata Power has formed a cooperation with Noida International Airport (NIA) to deliver renewable energy to the planned airport in Jewar, Uttar Pradesh's Gautam Buddha Nagar District. Dr. Praveer Sinha, CEO and managing director of Tata Power, commented on the alliance, "Tata Power is proud to partner with the Noida International Airport to pioneer renewable energy integration. This collaboration will support development of net zero Airports, catering to millions of Indians, accelerating the country's path towards a greener future."



India's Industrial Output Grows 3.1% in September 2024:-

According to figures issued by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation, India's industrial output increased by 3.1% in September 2024, boosted by a resurgence in manufacturing activity. The Index of Industrial Production (IIP) in India fell 0.1% in August. According to the report, manufacturing production jumped by 3.9% in September, while power generation grew by 0.5% and mining activity increased by 0.2%. In

the April-September period, industrial output increased by 4%, compared to revised 6.2% a year earlier.



\$8.5B Disney-Reliance Merger Completed for Indian Assets:-

Reliance Industries and Walt Disney have concluded a \$8.5 billion merger of their Indian media holdings. According to a joint press release issued by the firms, the newly established sections are entertainment, which includes Reliance's Colors TV networks and Disney's Star; digital, which includes online streaming services JioCinema and Hotstar; and sports. The resulting joint venture is controlled by Reliance Industries Limited and owned 16.34% by RIL, 46.82% by Viacom18 and 36.84% by Disney, according to the release.



India's Exports Soar 17% in October, Trade Deficit Hits \$27 Billion:-

India's merchandise exports increased at the quickest rate in 28 months in October, growing by 17.3 percent year on year (Y-o-Y) to \$39.2 billion, owing to inventory buildup in Western countries ahead of the Christmas season. However, imports reached an all-time high of \$66.34 billion in October, up 3.9 percent, extending the trade deficit, or the gap between imports and exports, to

\$27.1 billion from \$20.8 billion in September, according to commerce department data.



Tata Acquires Majority Stake in Pegatron's iPhone Plant in Tamil Nadu:-

According to sources quoted by Reuters, Tata Electronics is likely to purchase a majority stake in Pegatron's iPhone production unit in Tamil Nadu, significantly expanding Tata's role as an Apple supplier. The agreement states that Tata would own 60% of the facility and control daily operations, while Pegatron will own the remaining 40% and provide technical support. The move aligns with Apple's strategy to diversify its supply chain beyond China, amid growing geopolitical tensions between the U.S. and China.



India's GDP Growth Projection Revised to 6.4% Amid Global Uncertainties:-

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has revised its GDP growth forecast for the fiscal year 2024-25 to 6.4%, reflecting cautious optimism amid a complex economic environment. The updated projection factors in domestic resilience, such as robust consumption and private investment, against global challenges like geopolitical tensions and inflationary pressures. RBI Governor emphasized the critical role of policy reforms in sustaining economic stability while highlighting

emerging sectors like renewable energy and digital technology as key growth drivers. Analysts predict that the economy's strong fundamentals will continue to attract foreign investments despite global headwinds.



SEBI Eliminates 1% Security Deposit Mandate for Public Issues :-

In a move to enhance the ease of doing business, the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has abolished the requirement for companies to deposit 1% of their issue size as security. This decision aims to reduce financial and procedural barriers for issuers, encouraging greater participation in public offerings. It also reflects SEBI's proactive approach to fostering a favorable business environment.



RBI Doubles UPI 123Pay Limit to ₹10,000 for Feature Phones:-

In a major step toward increasing digital financial inclusion, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) raised the UPI 123Pay transaction limit from ₹5,000 to ₹10,000. UPI 123Pay enables India's 400 million feature phone users to access digital payment services without requiring a smartphone or an internet connection. This development is expected to empower rural and underserved populations, promoting a cashless economy while fostering ease of transactions for small-scale merchants and individual users. The move aligns with the

government's broader vision of a digitally inclusive society.



India's Forex Reserves See Sharpest Weekly Fall in Record, Hit 4-Month Low:-

Last week, India's foreign exchange reserves fell to a more than four-month low, the steepest weekly drop on record, as the dollar surged following the US election results and the central bank sold from its reserves to limit the rupee's loss. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) said that reserves declined by \$17.8 billion in the week ending November 15, the largest since available data began in 1998, to \$657.89 billion. Forex reserves have fallen by a total of nearly \$30 billion in the last six weeks and are down by \$47 billion from the record high of \$704.89 billion hit in late September.



Zomato to Replace JSW Steel on BSE Sensex from December 23:-

Zomato, the online food delivery behemoth, will join the benchmark BSE Sensex on December 23, replacing JSW Steel. This is part of the most recent reconstitution published by Asia Index Private Ltd, a subsidiary of BSE. Zomato's participation in the 30-stock index is a significant milestone for the company, which has

experienced a strong surge in the last year. Furthermore, the reconstitution affects other indices outside the Sensex, including the BSE 100, BSE Sensex 50, and BSE Sensex Next 50. As a part of the reshuffle in the BSE Sensex 50, key additions to the index include Zomato, Jio Financial Services and Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd.



India and Maldives Enhance Currency Cooperation :-

The RBI and the Maldives Monetary Authority inked an agreement here to create a framework to encourage the adoption of local currencies, the Indian Rupee and the Maldivian Rufiyaa (MVR), in cross-border transactions. The Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was inked by Shaktikanta Das, Governor of the Reserve Bank of India, and Ahmed Munawar, Governor of the Maldives Monetary Authority. "The MoU encourages the use of INR and MVR in current account transactions, permissible capital account transactions and any other economic and financial transactions as agreed upon by both countries," the RBI said in a statement.



Alphabet Gets CCI Nod to acquire stake in Walmart's Flipkart:-

The Competition Commission approved Alphabet's unit, Shoreline International Holdings LLC, for obtaining a stake in Walmart group firm Flipkart. Shoreline International Holding is a completely owned subsidiary of Google's parent company, Alphabet Inc. Flipkart is a subsidiary of Walmart Inc, which ultimately belongs to

the Walmart Group. It is primarily engaged in the business of wholesale cash and carry of goods and providing marketplace-based e-commerce platforms to facilitate trade between customers and sellers in India

Typhoon Kong-rey Unleashes Fury on Taiwan with Strong Winds:-

Heavy rains and high winds pelted Taiwan as the worst typhoon to strike the island in over three decades made landfall along its southeast coast, killing at least one person and wounding dozens more. As per the Joint Typhoon Warning Center (JTWC), Typhoon Kong-rey made landfall in Taitung county on October 31 afternoon with winds of up to 200 kilometers per hour (125 mph), comparable to a Category 3 Atlantic hurricane. At least two were killed and more than 500 storm-related injuries were reported, according to Taiwan's Central Emergency Operations Center (CEOC).



PM Modi congratulates Duma Boko on being elected Botswana president :-

On Sunday (November 3, 2024), Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated Botswana's President Duma Boko on his election and expressed his desire to work closely with him to further develop bilateral ties. Duma Boko, the Umbrella for Democratic Change (UDC) presidential candidate, took power as Botswana's sixth president last week. In a post on X, PM Modi said, "Congratulations @duma_boko on your election as the President of Botswana. Best wishes for a successful tenure." "Look forward to working closely with you to further strengthen our bilateral ties," PM Modi said.



EAM Jaishankar Inaugurates India's New Consulate in Brisbane:-

External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar inaugurated India's new consulate in Brisbane, Australia, saying ties between the two nations had been altered in recent years by events such as a trade agreement that has opened up countless prospects. The opening of the new consulate is a milestone in the increasingly strong bilateral relationship and an acknowledgement of the growing importance of the Australian state of Queensland, which holds an "important place in many ways in our burgeoning ties", Jaishankar said.



Donald Trump Set to Back in the White House as 47th President of USA:-


Former President Donald Trump is expected to become the 47th President of the United States after sweeping the recently ended presidential election. He received a congratulatory call from his Democratic opponent Kamala Harris after she conceded defeat. CNN stated that Harris "called President-elect Trump to congratulate him on winning the 2024 presidential election," citing a member of Harris' team. According to the report, she stressed the necessity of a peaceful transition of power and serving as president for all Americans. Trump is the first president after Grover Cleveland 132 years ago to be evicted from the White House and return to it again four years later.



Mount Lewotobi Laki-laki Erupts, Ash Column Reaches 6,500 Meters:-

Mount Lewotobi Laki-laki in Indonesia has erupted again, causing additional concern among inhabitants who have already been traumatized by explosions that killed at least ten people. The country's volcanology department reported seven eruptions, the most intense of which ejected a massive column of ash 8,000 meters (5

kilometers) into the air. Authorities declared a 7-kilometer (4.3-mile) exclusion zone around the volcano in Flores. More than 10,000 people are living in temporary shelters, with authorities warning of potential flash floods and cold lava flows in the coming days.



South Africa Launches Quick Visa Processing for Indian Visitors:-

The South African government this week introduced the Trusted Tour Operator Scheme (TTOS), a new tourism program aimed at increasing the number of visitors from India and China. In 2023, more than 100 million Chinese visitors traveled abroad, but just 93,000 visited South Africa. In contrast, Australia drew more than 1.4 million Chinese visitors. Indian tourists currently account for only 3.9% of all overseas visits in South Africa, with Chinese visitors accounting for 1.8%. The Department of Home Affairs said that even a 10% rise in tourism could improve economic growth by 0.6% and generate thousands of jobs.



Ramgoolam Set to become New PM of Mauritius:-

Following a historic victory in Mauritius' general election, Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated Dr Navin Ramgoolam, who is expected to become the country's new prime minister. PM Modi wished Ramgoolam success and said he looks forward to working with him to develop their "unique partnership" in a social media message. Dr Navin Ramgoolam, who is the son of Mauritius' first Prime Minister Seewoosagur Ramgoolam, has been the PM of the country between 1995 and 2000 and from 2005 to 2014.



Donald Trump Appointed Tulsi Gabbard As Director Of National Intelligence:-

Former Democratic congressman Tulsi Gabbard was chosen by US President-elect Donald Trump to be his administration's director of national intelligence. Tulsi Gabbard, 43, was born in American Samoa and reared in Hawaii, although she also spent some time growing up in the Philippines. She started politics at a young age, being elected to Hawaii's House of Representatives at the age of 21, but she resigned after one term to go with her National Guard unit to Iraq. Later, she became the first Hindu and American Samoan in Congress, representing Hawaii, and was sworn in on the Bhagavad Gita, a sacred Hindu text.



Typhoon Man-yi Strikes Northern Philippines :-

Typhoon-weary Filipinos have begun removing fallen trees and fixing damaged houses following Super

Typhoon Man-yi, the Philippines' sixth big typhoon in less than a month, which devastated the country and killed at least eight people. "More than a million people were affected by the typhoon and two previous storms, including nearly 7,00,000 who fled their homes and moved to emergency shelters or relatives' homes," according to a civil defense officer. The Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines and the Coast Guard report that most transportation services have resumed.



Victoria Kjaer Theilvig Becomes Denmark's First Miss Universe:-

Victoria Kjaer Theilvig of Denmark crowned the 73rd Miss Universe competition, which was held in Mexico. The 21-year-old battled against 125 other contestants from around the world, including India's Rhea Singha. Chidimma Adetshina of Nigeria was the first runner-up, and Maria Fernanda Beltran of Mexico came in second. Victoria is a Danish entrepreneur and professional dancer. The 21-year-old made history by becoming the first Miss Universe from Denmark. She gained international recognition in 2022 when she placed in the Top 20 of Miss Grand International.



Gabon Approves New Constitution in Historic Referendum:-

Gabonese voters overwhelmingly accepted a new constitution offered by the country's military leadership. According to media sources, the proposed new constitution limits the presidency to two terms and increases term lengths from five to seven years. The Central African Republic's new constitution also abolishes the role of prime minister and states that family members cannot replace a president. Gabon's military rulers have tentatively scheduled a handover to the civilian government for the summer of 2025.



Climate change responsible for 19% of rising dengue cases:-

Amid a record year for dengue infections worldwide, a recent study discovered that climate change is to blame for 19% of the increased dengue burden. According to a study published at the yearly convention of the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (ASTMH) in the United States, climate change has the potential to cause an extra 40-60% increase by 2050, with some locations seeing increases of up to 150-200%. The latest findings from researchers at Stanford and Harvard universities offer the most definitive evidence to date that climate change is a major factor driving the global surge in the mosquito-borne disease.



Nobel Peace Prize Laureates Announced in Oslo:-

The 2024 Nobel Peace Prize ceremony, held in Oslo, Norway, celebrated remarkable contributions to global peace and humanitarianism. This year, the award was shared between a global humanitarian organization addressing refugee crises and a renowned journalist advocating for press freedom. The organization was lauded for its lifesaving efforts in providing shelter, education, and healthcare to millions displaced by conflict and climate change. Meanwhile, the journalist was recognized for their fearless reporting in war zones, exposing human rights violations and fostering accountability. Nobel Committee Chair highlighted their efforts as "beacons of hope in tumultuous times," emphasizing the continued importance of humanitarian and journalistic integrity in promoting global stability.



Mali Junta Replaces Prime Minister Amid Political Unrest:-

In a significant political shake-up, Mali's ruling junta announced the dismissal of Prime Minister Choguel Maiga, replacing him with Abdoulaye Maiga. This move comes amidst ongoing challenges in governance, security, and public dissatisfaction. The junta stated that the leadership change aims to strengthen administrative stability as the nation prepares for a potential transition to civilian rule. The political developments in Mali are being closely monitored by international observers for their impact on regional stability in West Africa.



Armenia Joins International Solar Alliance:

Randhir Jaiswal, the official spokesperson for the Ministry of External Affairs, said that Armenia has become the 104th full member of the International Solar Alliance (ISA). On November 30, 2015, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and French President Francois Hollande established the ISA with the goal of scaling up solar energy and lowering the cost of solar power generation by aggregating demand for solar finance, technologies, innovation, research and development, and capacity building. Earlier on June 26 this year, Republic of Paraguay officially became its 100th full member.



Bali celebrates traditional Hindu thanksgiving festival 'Ngusaba':-

Bali boasts a diverse cultural heritage that incorporates Hindu philosophy, native animist traditions, and Buddhist influences. The Ngusaba Goreng, a two-week Thanksgiving festival commemorating a bountiful harvest, is one of Bali's most significant cultural festivals. The celebration revolves around religious dances such as Rejang Dewa and Rejang Pucuk, which are carried out by girls who have not yet reached puberty. 'Ngusaba' denotes a meeting of gods and goddesses. These ceremonies represent the Balinese people's strong spiritual connection to their ancestry and the divine.



IndusInd Bank Partners with UNICEF for Climate Action

IndusInd Bank has formed a strategic cooperation with UNICEF to improve climate risk management and community resilience in five Indian districts. The collaboration, which was formalized in a Statement of Intent, will focus on establishing disaster-resilient communities in Dharashiv (Maharashtra), Begusarai (Bihar), Virudhunagar (Tamil Nadu), Baran (Rajasthan), and Bahraich (Uttar Pradesh). The project is part of the bank's Holistic Rural Development program's Climate Action section.



Sri Lanka's Central Bank Eases Monetary Policy to Support Economic Recovery :-

Sri Lanka's central bank established an entirely novel policy rate of 8%, easing monetary conditions below previously used benchmarks in an effort to support the island nation's weak recovery from a major financial crisis. The Central Bank of Sri Lanka (CBSL) said the implementation of an overnight policy rate (OPR), which was predicted earlier this year, would make it easier for markets to react to lower interest rates and promote growth. Sri Lanka's economy is expected to grow by 4.5%-5% in 2024, slightly above the World Bank's estimate of 4.4%, an official at the bank said.

J&K: 12 civilians injured in grenade attack in Srinagar:-

On November 3, a grenade attack in Srinagar, the capital of Jammu and Kashmir, injured at least 12 civilians. The injured have been taken to the Shri Maharaja Hari Singh incident occurred Hospital (SMHS). The Srinagar's market, near the Tourist Reception Centre on 03 November. The explosion triggered fear in the vicinity, sending consumers fleeing for safety. Police and paramilitary forces have been rushed to the spot to evacuate the injured and launch a search operation to track the terrorists. Jammu and Kashmir chief minister Omar Abdullah condemned the incident, calling it "deeply disturbing."



Justice DY Chandrachud Retires as Chief Justice of India

Justice D Y Chandrachud's stint as India's 50th Chief Justice ended after two years of transformational verdicts and significant reforms, leaving a unique legacy in Indian judicial history. During his eight-year term as a Supreme Court judge, he served on 38 constitution benches and delivered important decisions such as the Ayodhya land dispute, the repeal of Article 370, and the

decriminalization of consensual gay sex, all of which altered society and politics. India's 50th Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud, known also for his many pithy statements, leaves an imprint all his own on the annals of legal history.



Website Launched for 18th Pravasi Bharatiya Divas in Bhubaneswar:-

Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi has asked the overseas Indian diaspora to visit Odisha and attend the Pravasi Bharatiya Divas (PBD) conference in January 2025. The chief minister launched the website (pbdindia.gov.in) of the 18th Pravasi Bharatiya Divas in New Delhi alongside External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar, saying the convention will allow Indians living abroad to witness Odisha's rich history, cultural, and spiritual heritage. The PBD will be organised from January 8 to 10 at Janata Maidan in Bhubaneswar.



Tim Southee to Bid Farewell to Cricket After World Test Championship:-

Tim Southee, New Zealand's great pacer, has declared that he will retire from Test cricket after the third Test

against England at his home venue, Seddon Park in Hamilton, this December. Southee will retire from Test cricket, according to New Zealand Cricket (NZC), but he is still available to represent the Black Caps in the ICC World Test Championship (WTC) final next year provided the team qualifies. The 35-year-old, who has amassed 385 Test wickets over 104 matches, is New Zealand's second-highest wicket-taker in the format and is also the only bowler globally to achieve the rare feat of taking over 300 Test, 200 ODI, and 100 T20I wickets.



Indian Tennis Star Prajnesh Gunneswaran Announces Retirement:-

Prajnesh Gunneswaran, an Indian tennis player, has retired from professional tennis. The 35-year-old shared his choice on social media. Gunneswaran reached a career high of No. 75, becoming the eighth highest-ranked Indian player in the Open Era. He got this rating in 2019 after recovering from a knee injury and finishing the year as India's top men's singles player. He participated in the main draw of five Grand Slam tournaments and played in all four Grand Slams in 2019. He also won two ATP Challenger titles and a bronze medal at the 2018 Asian Games.



Mithali Raj Appointed Mentor for ACA Women's Cricket Operations:-

Mithali Raj, the former India women's cricket captain, will serve as the Andhra Cricket Association's Women's Cricket Operations Mentor. During her time with the ACA, she will be scouting and developing the state's talented cricket players. ACA Secretary S. Satish Babu verified the development and outlined the initiatives being taken to promote women's cricket in the state. He informed that ACA is setting up a High-Performance Academy in Anantapur for women's cricketers where around 80 girls from different age groups will be selected and trained for 365 days.



Punit Goenka's Resignation as MD and CEO of Zee Entertainment:-

Punit Goenka, Managing Director and key managerial personnel of Zee Entertainment Enterprises (ZEEL), has decided to step down as MD in order to focus only on his operational tasks allocated by the board, and will remain as CEO of the company. In addition, the board approved Mukund Galgali, the company's Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and important managerial staff, as Deputy CEO. According to the company, Goenka has approached the board of directors of ZEEL with an approach to focus

entirely on his operational responsibilities as the CEO of the company and relinquish his position as the MD.




Delhi Hosts Global Summit on Sustainable Energy Transition:-

Experts hailed the recognition as a step towards safeguarding the cultural heritage of traditional weaving techniques amidst rapid industrialization.



Cyclone Fengal Forms in the Bay of Bengal, Heavy Rains Expected :-

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has announced the formation of Cyclone Fengal, a system that originated as a cyclonic circulation in the Bay of Bengal. Named by Saudi Arabia, Fengal is projected to bring heavy rainfall to Tamil Nadu and neighboring regions. Authorities have issued alerts for potential flooding and disruptions, urging residents to stay vigilant. Fishermen have been advised against venturing into the sea. This development underscores the importance of enhanced weather monitoring and disaster preparedness in cyclone-prone areas.

Emma McKeon, Australia's most decorated Olympian, has announced her retirement from competitive swimming. McKeon has the Australian record for 14 Olympic medals, six of which were gold, won over three Summer Olympics, and her seven medals at Tokyo 2020 are the most ever won by a female swimmer at a single Games and the equal most won by any female athlete from any discipline at a single Olympics. McKeon, 30, had previously hinted that the 2024 Paris Games -- where she won gold in the 4 x 100m freestyle relay -- would be her final Olympics, but she had not said whether she would continue to swim competitively.

Ayushman Bharat: Free Health Coverage for Seniors 70+

In a significant expansion of the Union government's flagship program, the Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PM-JAY), Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced that health coverage within the scheme is going to be available to all senior citizens aged 70 and up, irrespective of income. The scheme was introduced to "overcome the despair of the poor when illness strikes", the PM said, noting that the government bears the cost of hospitalisation for scheme beneficiaries up to ₹5 lakh.



Four replicas of Konark wheel installed at Rashtrapati Bhavan:-



The decision to install replicas of the 'wheels of life and time' from Odisha's Konark Sun Temple, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is part of the government's larger endeavor to incorporate traditional, cultural, and historical components into Rashtrapati Bhavan. Konark epitomises the Odiya temple architecture, designed as a massive chariot for the Sun God. The wheels depicted around the temple walls symbolise India's cultural legacy.



India's First Green Certified Zoo Opens in Himachal Pradesh:-

In an important environmental milestone, the Durgesh Aranya Zoological Park, located in Bankhandi, Kangra district of Himachal Pradesh, has been awarded India's first green certification for a zoological park by the Indian Green Building Council (IGBC). This certification recognizes the zoo's sustainable architecture, energy-efficient infrastructure, and eco-friendly practices. Designed to minimize environmental impact, the zoo

incorporates renewable energy sources, water conservation measures, and recycling programs. The initiative aligns with India's commitment to sustainable development, aiming to create a model for future wildlife conservation facilities nationwide.



Indonesia's new President Prabowo Subianto may be Republic Day 2025 chief guest:-

Indonesian President Prabowo Subianto might be the keynote guest at the 2026 Republic Day celebrations. His visit might strengthen bilateral defence cooperation, particularly the prospective transfer of BrahMos missiles. Prabowo, a former defense minister and the son-in-law of former Indonesian President and strongman Suharto, has expressed a desire to strengthen strategic ties with India, including the procurement of BrahMos missiles. Under Prabowo's presidency, Indonesia could be the second country after the Philippines to purchase BrahMos missiles.



Centre Doubles Stubble Burning Penalty Post Supreme Court Directive :-

In response to the Supreme Court's (SC) criticism of the Environment Protection Act (EPA) of 1986 and its "toothless" punishments, the Union Ministry of

Environment, Forest, and Climate Change doubling stubble burning fines to battle deteriorating air quality in Delhi and adjacent areas. The updated penalties, introduced under the Commission for Air Quality Management (CAQM) Act of 2021, impose a Rs 5,000 fine on farmers with less than two acres, Rs 10,000 on those between two and five acres, and Rs 30,000 for larger landholders engaging in the practice.



Supreme Court Overturns 1967 Ruling on AMU's Minority Status:-

In a narrow 4-3 majority decision, the Supreme Court overturned its 1967 opinion in S. Azeez Basha v. Union of India, which had earlier denied Aligarh Muslim University (AMU) minority institution status. The majority decision was written by former Chief Justice of India (CJI) D.Y. Chandrachud and supported by Justices Sanjiv Khanna, JB Pardiwala, and Manoj Misra. Justices Surya Kant, Dipankar Datta, and S.C. Sharma all dissented in different opinions. Article 30(1) of the Constitution guarantees religious and linguistic minorities the fundamental right to establish and manage educational institutions of their choice.



Delhi: Sarai Kale Khan Chowk Renamed to Bhagwan Birsa Munda Chowk :-

In a major announcement, Union Minister of Urban Development Manohar Lal Khattar announced that the Sarai Kale Khan Chowk will henceforth be called as Birsa Munda Chowk. The decision was made to commemorate the 150th birth anniversary of Bhagwan Birsa Munda, a freedom fighter and tribal leader. The Union Minister stated that the decision was made to honour the freedom warrior so that visitors to the area might learn about him and be inspired by his life. Birsa Munda, the hero of the Indian tribal freedom struggle, played a pivotal role in inspiring the tribal community of the Chotanagpur region to fight for their independence.



India Launches Comprehensive Space Policy to Boost Innovation:-

In a significant move, India unveiled its comprehensive space policy, aimed at enhancing private sector participation and fostering global collaborations. This policy focuses on creating a robust ecosystem for satellite development, space exploration, technological innovation. Bibek Debroy, Chairman of PM's Economic Advisory Council, Dies at 69:-

Bibek Debroy, an economist and head of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's economic advisory council, died at age 69. Mr Debroy, a Padma Shri recipient, previously served as chancellor of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics (GIPE) in Pune. Mr Debroy received his education at Ramakrishna Mission School in Narendrapur, Presidency College in Kolkata, the Delhi School of Economics, and Trinity College in Cambridge. He had worked in Presidency College, Kolkata; Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Pune; Indian Institute of Foreign Trade, Delhi; and also as the Director of a Ministry of Finance/UNDP project on legal reforms.



Rohit Bal, noted fashion designer, passes away at 63:-

The renowned designer Rohit Bal has gone. The designer was only 63 years old and had suffered a heart attack the previous year. He returned to the fashion scene a few weeks ago during Lakme Fashion Week. Bal was recognized as a trailblazer in the Indian fashion industry, creating designs that defied convention. He was noted perfectly merging classic aesthetics contemporary flare, as well as for combining India's cultural heritage with worldwide fashion trends. He had been away from the fashion world in the past few years due to health issues. The Fashion Design Council of India (FDCI) confirmed the news with a post on their official Instagram handle.



Kannada filmmaker Guruprasad passes away :-

Guruprasad, 52, a Kannada cinema director known for films such as Mata, Eddelu Manjunatha, and Director's Special, was allegedly discovered dead in his apartment in Madanayakanahalli, Bengaluru. Police have initiated a probe into the date and circumstances surrounding Kannada director Guruprasad's demise. The director, who had recently remarried, was reportedly experiencing financial troubles, including suspicions of unpaid purchases. Guruprasad was not only a director but also acted in several films and was working on his latest project, Adema, when he passed away.



Former Tamil Nadu Chief Secy Shankar Passes Away :-

P. Shankar, former Tamil Nadu Chief Secretary, died in a Chennai hospital after a brief illness. He was 81. He has held the position for a brief time, from 2001 to 2002. Shankar was the younger sibling of P. Murari, an Indian Administrative Service (IAS) official and Principal Secretary to the President. Shankar was born in Chennai on August 20, 1943, and earned his post-graduate degree in Economics from RKM Vivekananda College. He joined the IAS in July 1966. In September 2002, Shankar was appointed as the Central Vigilance Commissioner, a position he held till 2006.



Music Legend Quincy Jones Dies At 91:-

Quincy Jones, a music giant who collaborated with Michael Jackson and Frank Sinatra, died at the age of 91, Variety reported. During his 70-year career, he received 28 Grammy Awards. Quincy had some amazing accomplishments to his name. He also produced the soundtrack for the 1969 picture The Italian Job, starring Michael Caine. His 1990 record Back on the Block earned him six of his 27 Grammy Awards, and he was named Producer of the Year three times. He is best known for his production collaborations with the pop icon Michael Jackson, which started in 1979 with the singer's solo album Off the Wall.



Folk Singer Sharda Sinha Passes Away At 72:-

Sharda Sinha, known for her heartfelt Chhath songs, died after suffering multiple myeloma, a kind of blood disease, for many years. She was 72. Sharda Sinha has been a musical veteran since the 1970s, making significant contributions to Bhojpuri, Maithili, and Hindi folk music. In 2018, she received the Padma Bhushan for her efforts in regional film, as well as a National Film Award. Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed his condolences on the passing of legendary folk singer Sharda Sinha.



The first Miss World, Kiki Hakansson passes away at 95

Kiki Hakansson, the very first Miss World, died quietly at the age of 95. She died in her sleep at home in California. The news was made via the official Miss World Instagram account. Kiki Hakansson, born in Sweden, made history in 1951 when she was crowned Miss World at the first Miss World competition, held in London. Held on July 29, 1951, at the Lyceum Ballroom, the pageant was initially conceived as a one-time event tied to the Festival of Britain. However, the contest went on to become a global institution, and Kiki's victory marked the beginning of the Miss World legacy.




'Candyman' actor Tony Todd passes away at 69:-

Tony Todd, best known for his appearances in Final Destination and Candyman, died at the age of 69. He died in his Los Angeles home. According to Deadline, his representative confirmed the news, but did not reveal the cause of his death. Tony Todd, who was born in Washington, D.C. in 1954 and raised in Connecticut, has a legacy of over 240 film and television credits. Mewar Praja Mandal was established in April 1938 and Somtiya was about 15 years old at that time.



Mahendra Singh Mewar, descendant of Maharana Pratap, dies at 83:-

Mahendra Singh Mewar, a famous member of the Mewar royal family and former Member of Parliament from Chittorgarh, died at the age of 83. He was elected to the Lok Sabha as a BJP candidate from the Chittorgarh constituency in 1989. Mahendra Singh Mewar was a descendant of Maharana Pratap, the 16th-century Rajput ruler of Mewar who reigned until his death in 1597.



Veteran Tamil Actor Delhi Ganesh Passes Away At 80 In Chennai:-

Delhi Ganesh, a renowned renowned Tamil actor and former Indian Air Force officer, was cremated with full Air Force honors in Chennai on Monday, November 11. The 80-year-old actor died on November 9th, due to problems from his advanced age. Delhi Ganesh, known for his decades-long contribution to Tamil cinema, began his career as an officer in the Indian Air Force before moving on to acting. The veteran actor's stage name, Delhi Ganesh, was given by filmmaker K Balachander, who gave him his first break in 1976 with Pattina Pravesam.



Former UK Deputy PM John Prescott Passes Away :-

John Prescott, Britain's former Deputy Prime Minister and an influential figure in the Labour Party, has passed away at 86. Known for his commitment to social justice, Prescott championed the cause of the working class and played a crucial role in shaping policies during Tony Blair's government. His career spanned decades, earning him respect as a steadfast advocate for equality and fairness.



UK's John Tinniswood, World's Oldest Man, Passes Away at 112:-

Briton John Tinniswood, the world's oldest man, died at 112 years old in a care home in Southport, northwest England, according to his family via Guinness World Records. Tinniswood was born in Liverpool on August 26, 1912. He died quietly. He became the world's oldest man in April 2023, when Venezuelan Juan Vicente Perez died at the age of 114. Having lived through monumental events such as the sinking of the Titanic and both World Wars, Tinniswood attributed his remarkable longevity to "pure luck.

Lahore Declared the Most Polluted City in the World Again:-

Lahore has once again acquired the dreadful title of the world's most polluted city, with the Air Quality Index (AQI) reaching a record 708. PM2.5 readings were 431 $\mu g/m^3$, 86 times higher than the World Health Organization's recommended yearly limit. The city's pollution crisis, caused by unrestrained vehicular emissions, antiquated industrial practices, and weak environmental policies, has resulted in a deadly smog that lingers year-round, indicating widespread environmental mismanagement.



Greenpeace Report: 77% of Women Feel Unsafe on Delhi Buses After Dark:-

According to a new Greenpeace India survey, 77% of women feel insecure on Delhi buses after dark, despite the success of the city government's fare-free bus travel plan, which has handed over 100 million 'Pink Tickets' to women since October 2019. This plan has been praised for making public transportation more accessible to

women by allowing them to ride Delhi's buses for free, promoting financial independence. In fact, 75% of surveyed women noted significant financial savings thanks to the scheme.



Guinness Records Set in Ayodhya Over 25 lakhs Diyas on Deepotsav 2024 :-

During this year's Diwali celebrations in Ayodhya, two Guinness World Records were set for lighting and devotional practices. Over 25 lakh (2.5 million) traditional oil lamps, or diyas, were illuminated alongside the riverbanks, and 1,121 persons performed the aarti process together, an unprecedented occurrence in the city's annual Deepotsav. The record-breaking events took held on 55 ghats, including the popular Ram ki Paidi. Drones were deployed to verify the impressive scale of the display, capturing the precise count of lamps along the Saryu river, which serves as a significant landmark in Ayodhya.



Top Countries in AI Preparedness Index 2023-24:-

In a spectacular literary debut, teenage poet Prosenjit Nath of Silchar has issued his first poetry collection, "Yeast of Eden." This potential new voice in poetry has already received substantial notice, with the book's blurb written by renowned multilingual poet K. Satchidanandan, a Sahitya Akademy awardee and president of the Kerala Sahitya Akademy. In his synopsis, he stated that Prosenjit's work in this collection demonstrates his ability to articulate poetry while also reflecting the diverse variety of themes, moods, and emotions that the poet explores.




Jeff Bezos becomes world's second richest man after Amazon stock prices jump by 7%:-

Jeff Bezos, the creator of Amazon, has sold another significant portion of the company's stock. According to a recent regulatory filing (viewed by GeekWire), Bezos sold more than \$3 billion worth of Amazon stock. With the latest stock transaction, he has now sold nearly \$13 billion in Amazon stock this year. Amazon's stock price increased by 7% this week following the release of its third-quarter results report, which exceeded market forecasts. The surge in Amazon's stock price has also boosted the net worth of founder Jeff Bezos, who currently ranks second (after X owner Elon Musk and before Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg) on the Bloomberg Billionaires Index with a net worth of \$222 billion.



UPI Transactions Reach Record High in October with Rs 23.5 Trillion in Value :-

The Unified Payments Interface (UPI) has continued to develop, with October seeing its biggest transaction volume and value to date. Based on data from the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), UPI handled 16.58 billion transactions worth Rs 23.5 lakh crore last month. This jump in UPI transactions represents a 10% increase in volume and a 14% increase in value over September, according to NPCI data reported by IANS. Daily UPI transactions also reached new highs, exceeding 535 million in volume and Rs 75,801 crore in value.



Collins Dictionary Names "Brat" 2024 Word of the Year

"Brat," inspired by Charli XCX's album of the same name, has been named the Collins English Dictionary's 2024 Word of the Year. The dictionary defines the adjective "brat" as "characterized by a confident, independent, and hedonistic attitude." Charli XCX's "Brat" album, released in June, has taken the world by storm, with the vivid "brat green" color dominating summer clothing and the "Apple Dance" trending on social media. The album was ranked No. 13 on the Billboard Top 200 chart on 01 November, and in June, "Brat" ranked as the top Dance/Electronic Album, according to Billboard.



Significant Rise Himalayan Glacial Lakes Increase 10.81% from 2011 to 2024:-

The Himalayan glacier lakes are quickly expanding, posing a growing hazard to humans and ecosystems. Between 2011 and 2024, the surface area of these lakes increased by 10.81%, mostly due to climate change. The situation is even more urgent in India, where glacial lakes expanded by 33.7% during the same time period, according to a Central Water Commission (CWC) assessment. This dramatic growth heightens the risk of glacial lake outburst floods (GLOFs), which could have catastrophic consequences for downstream regions.



India Becomes Second Largest Smartphone Market by Unit Volume in Q3 2024:-

Counterpoint Research believes that India's smartphone industry would be the second largest in the world by unit volume and the third largest by value in the third quarter (Q3) of calendar year (CY) 2024. In Q3 smartphone shipments, India accounted for 15.5% of global shipments, trailing only China, which led with 22%. The US followed India with a 12 per cent share. By value, India ranked third, holding around 12.3 per cent of the market in Q3 CY 2024, up from 12.1 per cent in the same quarter last year.



India's patent filings double in five years, country now ranks 6th globally:-

According to the World Intellectual Property Organization's (WIPO) 2024 report, India has made great progress in the global intellectual property (IP) landscape, ranking among the top ten countries for patents, trademarks, and industrial design. India now ranks sixth in the world with 64,480 patent applications, with more than half (55.2%) coming from domestic applicants—a first for the country. Furthermore, India granted 149.4% more patents in 2023 compared to the previous year, underscoring the rapid expansion of its IP ecosystem.



Public Sector Banks Post Strong H1 FY25 Growth, Driven by Reforms and Technology:-

Public Sector Banks (PSBs) in India performed well in the first half of fiscal year 2024-25, with aggregate business growing by 11% year on year (YoY). This accomplishment is attributable to comprehensive banking reforms implemented by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, which aim to improve and streamline India's banking industry. PSBs are making strides in digital innovation by adopting cutting-edge technologies like artificial intelligence, blockchain, and cloud computing.



WPI Inflation Soars to 4-Month High of 2.36% in October Amid Surge in Food Prices:-

Wholesale price inflation reached a four-month high of 2.36 percent in October, as food costs, particularly vegetables, and manufactured products surged, according to official statistics. The wholesale pricing index (WPI)-based inflation rate was 1.84 percent in September 2024. It was (-)0.26% in October last year. According to the report, food inflation reached 13.54 percent in October, up from 11.53 percent in September. This was led by 63.04 per cent inflation in vegetables, as against 48.73 per cent in September.



Shanghai, Tokyo, New York, and Houston Leading Emitters of Greenhouse Gases:-

A new dataset revealed at the United Nations climate negotiations shows that cities in Asia and the United States are the top producers to greenhouse gas emissions. Shanghai leads the list of polluted cities, closely followed by Tokyo, New York, and Houston. Climate Trace's data, produced utilizing enhanced observations and artificial intelligence, emphasizes the urgent need for global action to prevent climate change. Earth's total greenhouse gas emissions rose to 61.2 billion metric tons in 2023, a 0.7% increase from the previous year.



WHO Reports Highlight Challenges in Malaria Eradication:-

A recent report by the World Health Organization (WHO) emphasized the persistent challenges in eliminating malaria, particularly in regions with limited healthcare infrastructure. Emerging issues such as drug resistance and climate change have further complicated eradication efforts. WHO called for increased investments in innovative treatments and vaccines, alongside community-based interventions like insecticide-treated nets. Despite setbacks, the global malaria death toll has steadily declined over the years, reflecting progress coordinated international efforts and through advancements in diagnostic tools.



S&P Global Revises India's GDP and Inflation Projections:-

S&P Global Ratings maintained India's GDP prediction for the current fiscal year 2024-25 at 6.8 percent, but reduced economic growth forecasts for the next two years. The global rating agency estimated India's GDP at 6.7% in 2025-26 and 6.8% in 2026-27, down 20 basis points (100 basis points equals 1 percentage point) from earlier predictions. The rating agency predicted a 7% growth rate for India in 2027-28. "In India we see GDP growth easing to 6.8 per cent this fiscal year (2024-25) as high interest rates and a lower fiscal impulse temper urban demand," said S&P Global Ratings.

Namo Drone Didi Scheme Empowers Women Self Help Groups (SHGs):-

The Indian Government has introduced the 'Namo Drone Didi' scheme, a unique initiative under the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Rural Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NRLM) aimed at empowering Women Self Help Groups (SHGs). This scheme provides drones to SHG members, offering training on how to operate them for agricultural purposes, land mapping, and other activities that can boost rural livelihoods. With a substantial budget allocation, the initiative aims to create new income opportunities for women and support sustainable economic development in rural areas, positioning SHGs as vital contributors to India's technological advancement in agriculture and resource management.



India Commits to 30% Protected Areas in Updated Biodiversity Plan:-

India has pledged to a UN agency to increase its budgetary assistance for biodiversity conservation by 2.5 times over the following six years, with the goal of converting at least 30% of its degraded land and sea

areas into habitats for wildlife. The aim was noted in the newest national biodiversity strategy and action plan, which was issued on the sidelines of the 16th Conference of Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity in Columbia. Between 2017 and 2022, the Union government on an average spent over Rs 33,200 crore every year on biodiversity conservation.



MP government rolls out 35% reservation for women in state job openings :-

In a crucial move, the Madhya Pradesh cabinet approved a proposal to boost women's reservation in state government services from 33% to 35%. The decision was made during a cabinet meeting headed by Chief Minister Mohan Yadav. Deputy Chief Minister Rajendra Shukla stated that the cabinet has resolved to raise the upper age restriction for recruiting associate professors in medical institutes from 40 to 50 years. Shukla said the decision will be implemented in all recruitments done through the state Public Service Commission and the Employees Selection Board.



Australia to Ban Social Media for Children Under 16:-Australia's Prime Minister Anthony Albanese announced that the government would pass legislation prohibiting

children under the age of 16 from using social media, claiming that this is a world-leading policy. Legislation will be tabled in parliament this year, and it will take effect 12 months after lawmakers ratify it, he said. According to Communications Minister Michelle Rowland, impacted sites would include Meta sites' Instagram and Facebook, as well as Bytedance's TikTok and Elon Musk's X. Alphabet's YouTube would likely also fall within the scope of the legislation, she added.



Health ministry Launches new Scheme to Boost Medical Device Industry:-

Union Health and Family Welfare Minister JP Nadda announced the "Strengthening the Medical Device Industry" initiative, giving Rs 500 crore to improve important parts of the sector. The initiative focuses on the production of critical components and accessories, skill development, clinical study assistance, the development of shared infrastructure, and overall industry promotion. Addressing the gathering, the Union Minister described the scheme as a potential game changer that would not only strengthen the industry but also mark a significant step towards India's self-reliance.



Govt. Invites Proposals for Green Hydrogen Excellence Centers:-

The government has sought applications to establish a center of excellence through the National Green

Hydrogen Mission's Research and Development (R&D) Scheme. The goal is to build Centres of Excellence (CoE) to foster innovation and promote sustainability, resulting in long-term energy independence, according to a statement from the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy (MNRE). These CoEs will accelerate the transition to a low-carbon economy by advancing green hydrogen production, storage and utilisation technologies, it added.



Amit Shah Greenlights Rs. 725.62 Crore for Fire Services Expansion:-

A high-level committee led by Union Home Minister Amit Shah approved three projects totaling Rs 725.62 crore for the expansion and modernization of fire services in Chhattisgarh, Odisha, and West Bengal. According to an official announcement, the committee authorized Rs 376.76 crore for West Bengal, Rs 201.10 crore for Odisha, and Rs 147.76 crore for Chhattisgarh as part of the 'Expansion and Modernisation of Fire Services' across the states. The high-level committee comprised of Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan and Vice Chairman NITI Aayog Suman K Bery as members.



New Bike Taxi Service by Delhi Metro Includes Women-Driven Rides:-

Delhi Metro users may now book bike taxis directly from the official DMRC mobile app, DMRC Momentum (Delhi Sarthi 2.0), removing the need to utilize different apps. Dr. Vikas Kumar, DMRC's Managing Director, unveiled this new function. The service provides two types of bike taxis: SHERYDS, created exclusively for women, and RYDR, open to all riders. This initiative is tailored to meet the unique needs of female metro riders, providing a safer and more convenient travel option. It allows women to travel independently while ensuring their safety and comfort.



Clean Ganga mission to start special Dolphin Ambulance:-

Cleaning the Ganga entails protecting its unique biodiversity, particularly its endangered inhabitants, dolphins. The National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG), the primary organization responsible for cleaning the sacred river, plans to launch a special Dolphin Ambulance to rescue injured aquatic animals. Ganga Dolphins, India's national aquatic mammal, can also be found in the rivers of Bangladesh and Nepal. Under the ambitious project approved for conservation of the Ganga River Dolphin, a specialised vehicle will be developed to assist dolphins in distress.



Govt Should Include Coking Coal in Critical Minerals List: NITI Aayog:-

According to a Niti Aayog report, the government must add coking coal to the list of critical minerals and offer special dispensation to increase domestic production of the main raw material for steel manufacture. According to the report 'Enhancing Domestic Coking Coal Availability to Reduce Coking Coal Imports', given India's commitment to Net Zero by 2070, the country's interests would be better served by fully utilising India's proved reserves of medium coking coal (16.5 billion tonnes) for metallurgical purposes.



Over 50 nations endorse Baku declaration on climate action in tourism :-

In a historic move, the UN Climate Change COP29 has included tourism on its action agenda, with over 50 states signing the COP29 Declaration on Enhanced Climate Action in Tourism. This ground-breaking effort, sponsored by Azerbaijan's COP29 Presidency, aspires to convert the global tourism industry into one that is climate resilient and low-carbon. With its tourism declaration, the COP29 Presidency is focused on supporting the tourism sector, a key economic driver, in adopting sustainable practices to reduce its environmental impact.



Shivraj Singh Chouhan Launches 'Nayi Chetna' Campaign Against Gender Violence:-

According to Union Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, the Nayi Chetna initiative aims to aid women in every hamlet by forming self-help organizations to combat gender abuse. He emphasized the need of women speaking up in the face of violence. The goals of Nayi Chetna 3.0 include promoting awareness about all forms of gender-based violence, encouraging communities to speak up and demand action, giving access to support networks for immediate aid, and empowering local institutions to take decisive action against violence.



Cabinet Approves 'One Nation One Subscription' Scheme:-

The Cabinet has authorized the One Nation One Subscription (ONOS), which will provide students, faculty, and researchers from all higher education institutions managed by the central and state governments, as well as research and development institutions, with access to worldwide scholarly research articles and journal publications. According to an announcement from the Ministry of Education, the initiative will benefit nearly 1.8 crore students, educators, researchers, and scientists across all disciplines. The government further said that access to journals will be provided through a national subscription coordinated by the Information and Library Network (INFLIBNET).



Delhi Govt Launches Portal for Old-Age Pension Scheme

Residents 60 years of age and beyond can now get monthly financial assistance under the Delhi government's Senior Citizen Pension Scheme. Over 10,000 applications were received on the first day of the program, indicating a high level of demand for the aid. Under the program, the state created 80,000 more registration spots for senior persons. Seniors 60 to 69 years old will earn ₹2,000 per month under the program, while those 70 and above will receive ₹2,500. Additional benefits are available for applicants from scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, and minority communities.



'Bal Vivah Mukt Bharat' Campaign Launched by Union Minister:-

Annapurna Devi, Union Minister for Women and Child Development, launched the "Bal Vivah Mukt Bharat Campaign". The government launched Beti Bachao Beti Padhao [rescue girls, educate girls] ten years ago in an effort to change how society perceives girls. This growth reflects a shift in attitudes about the value of the girl child. At the portal's inauguration, Devi stated, "The next step is to clear the way for her to fulfill all of her goals and not allow customs like child marriage to impede her potential development."

15: Science & Technology



China Launches New Crew to Expand Space Station Operations:-

China successfully launched its spacecraft, sending three astronauts, including the country's first female space engineer, on a six-month mission to fine-tune its low-orbiting space station. A Long March-2F carrier rocket launched the crewed spaceship Shenzhou-19 from northwest China's Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre. China constructed its space station after being purportedly barred from the International Space Station (ISS) due to worries that China's space program is manned by its military, the People's Liberation Army (PLA). It is currently the only country to have a space station.



India's first 'Make in India' C-295 transport aircraft to roll out in September 2026 :-

Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his Spanish counterpart Pedro Sánchez inaugurated India's first private military aircraft manufacturing facility in Vadodara, marking a watershed moment in the country's defense industry environment. The opening marks a significant shift toward increasing self-reliance in military production, consistent with the Centre's 'Make in India'

strategy. The facility will primarily focus on the assembly of the Airbus C-295 aircraft, which is set to enhance the capabilities of the Indian Air Force (IAF) while fostering indigenous manufacturing. The facility is expected to become operational by November this year, with the first indigenously manufactured C-295 projected to roll out by September 2026.



Scientists Discover First Black Hole Triple System:-

In a landmark discovery, a team of scientists has identified a unique "black hole triple" system, the first of its kind to be documented. This extraordinary system consists of three black holes orbiting each other in complex gravitational interactions, located roughly 8,000 light years from Earth in a remote constellation. The discovery was made using advanced space observatories that can detect and study high-energy phenomena far beyond our galaxy. This configuration provides new insights into black hole formation, interaction, and the nature of gravity, which could help deepen our understanding of cosmic evolution and high-energy astrophysics.



Discovery of Lost Mayan City in Mexico Using Advanced LiDAR Technology:-

In an exciting archaeological discovery, scientists have used LiDAR (Light Detection and Ranging) technology to uncover a lost Mayan city hidden beneath the dense vegetation of the Mexican jungle. This groundbreaking technology allowed researchers to detect ancient structures obscured by the forest canopy, revealing a network of pyramids, temples, and residential buildings from the ancient Mayan civilization. The discovery sheds light on Mayan urban planning and architectural prowess, adding to our understanding of their society and cultural heritage. This find is expected to pave the way for further studies in the field of remote sensing and archaeology.



NSE Launches Multilingual Mobile App and Website:-

The National Stock Exchange of India (NSE) launched its mobile application, NSEIndia, and expanded its website support to eleven regional languages, making financial data available to investors across India. The website now offers twelve languages, including Assamese, Bengali, Kannada, Malayalam, Oriya, Punjabi, Tamil, and Telugu, in addition to the previous selections of English, Hindi, Marathi, and Gujarati. This enables NSE to connect with investors across different regions and linguistic communities, promoting wider participation in financial markets.



ISRO Begins Groundbreaking Analogue Space Mission in Leh:-

The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) has launched the country's first analog space mission near Leh, Ladakh, where the agency will replicate life in an interplanetary habitat. The move has significance since India intends to send a human to the Moon in the near future. Analog space missions are field tests conducted in regions on Earth that have physical parallels to harsh space settings, and they play an important role in spaceflight problem resolution. The month-long mission comes in the wake of India's plans to set up lunar habitats, which could provide a base to launch interplanetary missions.



ISRO to Launch EU's Proba-3 Satellite in December:-

The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) will launch the European Union's Proba 3 Sun Observation Mission in December, according to Union Minister of State (independent charge) for Science and Technology, Jitendra Singh. The Proba-3 satellite, which docked at Sriharikota, was designed to observe the Sun's weak corona. This mission is India's third launch for the European Union, following support for the Proba-1 and

Proba-2 satellites, but it stands out since it focuses on solar observation. He also added that India aims at increasing its contribution to the global space economy from 2% to 10%.



Zimbabwe Launches ZIMSAT-2 to Advance Space Programme:-

Zimbabwe launched its second satellite, ZIMSAT-2, from Russia's Vostochny Cosmodrome, marking a significant milestone in the country's expanding space programme. This satellite, outfitted with a high-resolution multispectral camera, will help with agriculture, resource exploration, environmental monitoring, and disaster management. ZIMSAT-2, a low-earth observation satellite, was launched onboard the Soyuz-2.1 spacecraft in a collaborative effort by Zimbabwe's National Geo-Spatial and Space Agency (ZINGSA) and Southwest State University in Russia..



Bengaluru Unveils First Digital Population Clock at ISEC Bengaluru City's first digital population clock, which will display real-time population figures for Karnataka and the country, was launched at the city's Institute for Social and Economic Change (ISEC). The population clock, a project undertaken jointly by ISEC and the Union

Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), would update the estimated Karnataka population every one minute and ten seconds, and the country's population every two seconds. It has been set up at the entrance of ISEC with the objective of creating awareness about the population growth of the country and providing authentic data for researchers and scholars.



Rare H5 Bird Flu Case Found in Canadian Patient in B.C, Canada :-

Canada recently identified its first suspected human H5 bird flu infection. British Columbia (BC) confirmed the case after a teenager tested positive for avian influenza induced by the H5 influenza virus, according to an official statement posted on the western province's website. The teenager, who is believed to be sick, comes from the Fraser Health region and is currently receiving treatment at BC Children's Hospital. The positive test for H5 was conducted at the BC Centre for Disease Control's Public Health Laboratory, per the statement.



New Fire-Resilient, Dual-Blooming Plant Species Discovered in Western Ghats:-

A novel fire-resistant dual blooming species with a burst of flowering driven by grassland fires and an inflorescence structure unique to Indian species has been identified in the Western Ghats, which is known to harbor numerous yet-to-be-discovered species. Dr. Mandar Datar's team, which included Talegaon-Dabhade botanist Adittya Dharap and Ph.D. student Bhushan Shigwan, recently discovered a new species in the genus Dicliptera, which they named Dicliptera polymorpha. The species was collected from Talegaon- Dabhade, which is known region for its grasslands and fodder markets.



IIT Madras, ISRO Collaborate on Spacecraft Thermal Research Centre:-

The Indian Institute of Technology Madras (IIT Madras) has partnered with the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) to establish a new Centre of Excellence focused on "Fluid and Thermal Sciences." With an initial seed financing of Rs 1.84 crore from ISRO, the Centre would serve as a critical base for thermal management research, focusing on solutions for spacecraft and launch vehicles. The new Centre will concentrate on research related to spacecraft thermal management, combustion instability in hybrid rockets, and cryo-tank thermodynamics.



C-295 Full Motion Simulator Inaugurated at Air Force Station Agra :-

The Indian Air Force (IAF) has opened a full motion simulator (FMS) facility at Air Force Station Agra to train

and support its pilots on the newly imported medium tactical transport platform, Airbus C-295. Air Marshal Ashutosh Dixit, the OC-in-C of Central Air Command, opened the facility. The complex simulator allows pilots to train in a near-realistic environment by modeling operations such as tactical shift, paradropping, paratrooping, medical evacuation, and disaster relief. This cutting-edge facility will substantially enhance the operational capability of the C-295 fleet.



SpaceX to Launch India's Communication Satellite GSAT-20:-

SpaceX, the American aerospace corporation run by Elon Musk, will launch one of India's largest communication satellites, the GSAT-20, weighing 4,700 kg. SpaceX's Falcon 9 rocket was chosen for its ability to transport payloads weighing up to 8.3 tonnes to geostationary transfer orbit (GTO). This alliance is a departure for Isro, which has traditionally relied on its LVM-3 launcher, which can lift satellites weighing up to 4 tonnes to GTO. Owned and operated by New Space India Ltd, Isro's commercial arm, GSAT-20 — also known as GSAT N-2 — will enhance India's communication infrastructure.



India Leads Global Initiative on AI Ethics for Responsible Innovation:-

India has emerged as a key global leader in shaping ethical frameworks for artificial intelligence (AI) deployment. At an international tech summit, India introduced a pioneering initiative aimed at addressing concerns surrounding AI's impact on society, including issues like bias, transparency, and accountability. The initiative encourages global collaboration to ensure AI development aligns with human values, focusing on sectors like healthcare, education, and governance. With this, India aims to position itself not only as an innovator in AI but also as a thought leader in establishing a regulatory framework to govern its responsible use.




ISRO and ASA Collaborate for Gaganyaan Mission:-

IISc Develops STRONG Language for Nanopore Research

This breakthrough enables researchers to simulate and study the behavior of nanopores, paving the way for advancements in materials science, biotechnology, and nanomedicine. The development **STRONG** underscores India's leadership in cutting-edge research and its potential applications in DNA sequencing, drug



Prehistoric Footprints Discovered in Kerala:-

A stunning archaeological discovery has been made at Kanhirapoil in Madikkai panchayat, where 24 pairs of prehistoric footprints and a human figure were unearthed etched into rock on private property. Experts believe these engravings date back to the Megalithic period and provide an intriguing peek into ancient culture. The find was first reported by local archaeology enthusiast Satheesan Kaliyanam, following which archaeologist Professor Ajith Kumar and history Professor Nandakumar Koroth confirmed its significance during a site visit.



Raorchestes asakgrensis: New Frog Species Discovered in Meghalaya:-

A two-year investigation in Meghalaya by scientists from SACON (The Sálim Ali Centre for Ornithology and Natural History) in Anaikatti resulted in the discovery of a new frog species. They named the species 'Raorchestes asakgrensis' after the Eman Asakgre Community Reserve in the Garo Hills of Meghalaya, where it was discovered, to commemorate the people who helped them. The team, consisting of R S Naveen, S R Chandramouli, S Babu, PV karunakaran and HN Kumara, conducted surveys at 13 sites in the Garo and Khasi Hills between October 2020 and January 2022.

Ravindra Jadeja Climbs to 5th Spot in India's Test Wicket List:-

Ravindra Jadeja ended up being the fifth-highest Indian wicket-taker in Test cricket on the opening day of India's third match against New Zealand in Mumbai, passing Ishant Sharma and Zaheer Khan. Ishant had 311 wickets in 188 innings, whereas Zaheer had the same total in 165 innings. The speed pair tied for fifth place on the list of most wickets by an Indian bowler. Jadeja overtook them and is behind only Anil Kumble, R. Ashwin, Kapil Dev and

Harbhajan Singh. During the innings, Jadeja also overtook West Indies bowler Lance Gibbs (309) to become the eighth-highest wicket-taker among spinners.



Ind vs NZ 3rd Test: New Zealand scripts history as India suffers Test series whitewash:-

India faced the humiliation of being whitewashed at home for the first time in more than 24 years, dropping the third Test against New Zealand by 25 runs at the Wankhede Stadium in Mumbai on November 3. This is the first time India has been whitewashed 0-3 in a home Test series, and New Zealand is the first team to do so. The New Zealanders won the first Test in Bengaluru by eight wickets and the second in Pune by 113 runs. New Zealand's maiden series triumph in India going back to 1955 also snapped the hosts' home streak of 18 straight series triumphs since a 2-1 loss to England in 2012.



Wriddhiman Saha Announces Retirement from All Forms of Cricket:-

Wriddhiman Saha, a veteran India wicketkeeperbatsman, has announced his retirement from cricket after a more than 15-year career. Saha, 40, took to social media to announce that the current Ranji Trophy season will be his last. Since his international debut in 2010, the Bengal stumper has played 40 Tests and nine ODIs.

Wriddhiman Saha's career began with Bengal's Ranji Trophy team, when he replaced Deep Dasgupta, and he scored a century on debut in 2007. In Test cricket, he has played 40 matches, scoring 1,353 runs with an average of 29.41 and a highest score of 117, including three centuries.



Boxer Mandeep Jangra claims WBF world title :-

In boxing, Indian fighter Mandeep Jangra won the World Boxing Federation's Super Featherweight world title in the Cayman Islands. He defeated Britain's Conor McIntosh 10-0 in a decision that was unanimous. Mandeep became the first Indian pugilist to win a world championship in any professional boxing event category. Mandeep, who won a Commonwealth Games silver medal in the 2014 Glasgow edition, has faced only one defeat in his professional career so far. He has won 11 out of his 12 fights with seven being knockout victories.



4th LG Cup Horse Polo-2024 Tournament Inaugurated in Ladakh :-

Brigadier (Dr) BD Mishra, Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, launched the 4th LG Horse Polo Cup 2024 at Goshan Drass' Horse Polo Ground. During the event, he also unveiled Ladakh's first Polo Stadium at Goshan Drass, a landmark facility built for 6.84 crore rupees. This

tournament demonstrates Ladakh's commitment to preserve its polo history and improving sports infrastructure for local talent and tourists alike. He assured the community that next year's tournament will be even bigger, with plans to invite the President or Vice President of India to witness the event taking the event at the national level.



Arjun Erigaisi makes history by climbing to No. 2 on FIDE World Chess Rankings:-

Arjun Erigaisi, India's emerging chess star, has made history by rising to No. 2 in the FIDE World Chess Rankings with an astonishing third-round win over Alexey Sarana at the Chennai Grand Masters. This astounding accomplishment is the latest step in the 21-year-old's rapid career. Erigaisi's victory over Sarana not only increased his ranking, but also drove him to the top of the Masters category, where he is now tied with Iranian grandmaster Amin Tabatabaei after three rounds of tough battle.



Mohammad Nabi to Retire from ODI Cricket After ICC Champions Trophy 2025:-

Afghanistan's great allrounder Mohammad Nabi will retire from the ODI format following the conclusion of next year's Champions Trophy in Pakistan. The 39-year-old is the biggest player on Afghanistan's white-ball

teams. He appeared in their maiden ODI, scoring a half-century on debut against Scotland in 2009. Over 165 One-Day Internationals, he scored 3,549 runs at an average of 27.30 and grabbed 171 wickets. In the opening game of the ongoing three-match ODI series against Bangladesh in Sharjah, Nabi scored an impressive 82, helping his team set a competitive total, which they successfully defended with Allah Ghazanfar's six-wicket haul.



IND beat SA by 135 runs to win series 3-1 in Johannesburg:-

India delivered a record-breaking performance to cap a brilliant T20I tour of South Africa. Opting to bat, India scored a mammoth 283 for 1, owing to unbroken centuries from Tilak Varma (120 not out off 47 balls) and Sanju Samson (109 not out off 56 balls), before bowling South Africa out for 148 in 18.2 overs. Tristan Stubbs led South Africa in scoring with 46, while David Miller added 36. For India, pacer Arshdeep Singh was the most successful bowler with figures of 3/20 while Varun Chakravarthy (2/42) and Axar Patel (2/6) got two wickets each.



FIFA unveils NASA-inspired golden Club World Cup trophy:-

FIFA introduced a golden trophy designed in partnership with Tiffany & Co. for the disputed and recently expanded Club World Cup. The trophy, which has a 24-carat gold-plated finish, will be lifted by the tournament's victors in the United States next year. And, despite vehement opposition from players' unions and leagues, FIFA obviously sees a long-term future for the event, with the award giving room to engrave the winning teams' symbols for the next 96 years. It added the trophy drew inspiration from "NASA's Voyager deepspace missions in the 1970s, the periodic table, maps of pioneering journeys and astronomy."



Jyothi Surekha Wins Gold, Abhishek Verma Takes Silver at GT Open 2024:-

Compound archers Jyothi Surekha Vennam and Abhishek Verma won gold and silver medals in the GT Open, the second leg of this season's Indoor Archery World Series, held in Strassen, Luxembourg. The victory comes weeks after Atanu Das won bronze in the men's recurve category at the first stage of the series, the Swiss Open in Lausanne. More than 450 competitors from over 35 nations took part in this 18-metre target circuit event. In the final, reigning Asian Games champion Jyothi prevailed over Paasmeeri Marita of Belgium 147-145.



Odisha Wins Maiden Gold in 14th Senior National Hockey Championship:-

The Hockey Association of Odisha defeated Hockey Haryana to win the 14th Hockey India Senior Men National Championship championship at the Mayor Radhakrishnan Hockey Stadium in Chennai. Meanwhile, in the battle for third place, Uttar Pradesh Hockey upset Manipur Hockey, capping off an exciting final day of competition. In a dramatic final, the Hockey Association of Odisha overcame Hockey Haryana 5-1. In the fourth quarter, Shilanand Lakra (48', 57', 60') scored three goals in the span of 12 minutes to ensure victory for the Hockey Association of Odisha.



India Dominates at the Asian Athletics Meet with Record-Breaking Wins:-

Indian athletes delivered exceptional performances at the Asian Athletics Meet 2024, securing multiple gold medals and setting new records. The standout events included golds in track disciplines like 400m hurdles and field events such as long jump and discus throw. India's medal tally underscores the success of its sports development programs, which have focused on nurturing talent through advanced training facilities, scientific coaching methods, and international exposure. North-East United FC Clinches Governor's Gold Cup Victory:-

The 40th Governor's Gold Cup International Football Tournament came to an exciting conclusion on November 24, 2024, at Paljor Stadium in Gangtok. NorthEast United FC defeated Gangtok Himalayan SC in a dramatic 4-3 penalty shootout, adding another

unforgettable chapter to the tournament's history. The Governor's Gold Cup is a prominent football event known for encouraging skill and sportsmanship throughout India. The final match was the culmination of an exciting and competitive tournament, with both teams delivering outstanding performances.



Reetika Hooda Strikes Gold at World Military Championships:-

Vaibhav Suryavanshi of Samastipur, Bihar, made history by being the IPL's youngest player ever. In the IPL 2025 auction, he was signed by the Rajasthan Royals for ₹1.10 crore, highlighting his growing popularity in cricket. The

Rajasthan Royals and Delhi Capitals engaged in a furious bidding battle for the player, but Rajasthan emerged triumphant. Vaibhav's career exemplifies his hard work and talent, establishing him as a rising star in Indian cricket. He also made history by becoming the youngest player to debut in the Ranji Trophy, surpassing legends like Sachin Tendulkar and Yuvraj Singh.



India's Historic Victory Over Australia: Breaking a 47-Year Record:

India performed a powerful performance in Perth, winning the maiden Test by a stunning 295 runs, leaving Australia reeling and scrambling for explanations. Set an implausible target of 534, the world's top-ranked Test team collapsed for 238 in the final session of day four. This victory was India's largest in terms of runs on

India's Divith Reddy Crowned U-8 World Champion :-

Divith Reddy, an eight-year-old from Hyderabad, added to India's increasing chess reputation by winning the Under-8 World Cadets Chess Championship in Montesilvano, Italy. The Telengana youngster scored an impressive 9/11 points, as did his compatriot Sattwik Swain, but the former won the gold medal because to his tiebreak score. Divith, who has a FIDE rating of 1784 points, had a three-way tie with compatriot Sattwik and Ziming Guo of China but the Telengana boy clinched the gold with a better tie-break score.

Andhra Pradesh Launches Deepam 2.0 Scheme for Clean Cooking Energy:-

In an effort to improve living conditions for women and promote clean cooking energy, Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu has launched the Deepam 2.0 scheme in Edupuram, Srikakulam. This scheme provides free LPG cylinders to low-income households, specifically benefiting rural women who previously relied on firewood and other inefficient fuel sources. Naidu, who personally distributed the gas cylinders at the launch, emphasized the scheme's goal of improving public health and reducing environmental pollution. The initiative supports the state's broader objective of making clean cooking fuel accessible to all households by 2025.



Telangana Launches Statewide Caste Census:

The caste census, which was one of the Congress' preelection promises to analyze people's socioeconomic, job, political, and caste status, began in Telangana on November 6. The goal is to identify the population of each caste in order to promote social justice, as envisioned by Congress leader Rahul Gandhi. The state administration has created a dashboard to track the realtime development of the survey modules. In the first phase, the enumerators pasted stickers on each house using it as an identification mark to conduct the survey.



Bihar's Sultanganj Station Gets New Name Ajgaibinath Dham :-

Bihar Deputy Chief Minister Samrat Choudhary has stated that Sultanganj railway station in Bihar's Bhagalpur district will be renamed after the Hindu shrine Ajgaibinath Dham. Ajgaibinath Temple, an ancient shrine dedicated to Lord Shiva, is located in Sultanganj and is known for its beautiful carvings and inscriptions. The temple, located on the banks of the sacred Ganga River, is of great spiritual significance to believers. This decision underscores the government's commitment to honoring the region's cultural and religious heritage.



PV Sindhu Lays Foundation for World-Class Badminton Centre in Visakhapatnam:-

PV Sindhu, an Indian badminton star and Olympic medalist, set the groundwork for the PV Sindhu Centre for Badminton and Sports Excellence. The centre is three acres in size and is located in Chinna Gadili village on the city's outskirts. The Andhra Pradesh government had granted the property in 2021. Speaking during the event, Sindhu stated that the first step toward establishing a world-class facility has been taken.. She thanked Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, Vizag Police Commissioner Dr Shanka Brata Bagchi, and District Collector MN Harendhira Prasad for their support.



Launch of Uttar Pradesh's First Double-Decker Electric Bus by Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath:-

During the Aakanksha Haat programme at Indira Gandhi Pratishthan in Lucknow, Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath unveiled the state's first double-decker electric bus. The move intends to establish a bus service that will assist minimize traffic congestion and protect the environment in metropolitan areas. The CM also announced a 50% discount on tickets for female riders commuting on the double decker electric bus service. He additionally

announced to provide free travel facility to women in the services operated on the heritage route in the morning trip every Saturday.



Odisha's 24 Coastal Villages Recognised as 'Tsunami Ready' by UNESCO:-

The Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO designated 24 coastal villages in Odisha as 'Tsunami Ready'. The villages are in the districts of Balasore, Bhadrak, Kendrapada, Jagatsinghpur, Puri, and Ganjam, according to the statement. Furthermore, Tsunami Ready Recognition Certificates were renewed for two villages in the state. The villages are Noliasahi in Jagatsinghpur district and Venkatraipur in Ganjam district. They were recognised as Tsunami Ready in 2020. The recognition was given during the 2nd Global Tsunami Symposium held in Indonesia.



Andhra Pradesh Assembly Approves Bill To Withdraw Garbage Tax:-

The Andhra Pradesh government has decided to abolish the collecting of waste collection taxes. To this purpose, Municipal Administration Minister P. Narayana introduced an Amendment Bill to Repeal the Garbage Tax in the State Legislative Assembly. The Assembly approved it. Mr. Narayana criticised the former YSRCP government for implementing the garbage charge without consulting the people, claiming that women in some districts criticized the action. In certain areas, the drinking water supply was halted for no payment of garbage tax.



Election Results: INDIA Bloc Retains Jharkhand:

After trailing in the early rounds, Jharkhand Chief Minister Hemant Soren's JMM-led INDIA bloc rallied to win 56 seats in the state's 81-member parliament. The BJP, which had a significant lead when the counting began, won 21 seats. Hemant Soren's JMM contested 41 assembly seats, with the remaining seats going to its allies: Congress (30), Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) (6), and Communist Party of India (Marxist-Leninist) (4). The BJP contested 68 seats, while its allies, the All Jharkhand Students Union (AJSU) fought in 10, the Janata Dal (United) in two, and the Lok Janshakti Party (Ram Vilas) in one.



Election Results : BJP-Led Mahayuti Secures Landslide Victory In Maharashtra :-

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)-led Mahayuti coalition won a huge victory in Maharashtra, while the Jharkhand

Mukti Morcha (JMM)-led INDIA bloc reclaimed power in Jharkhand, according to the results of the assembly elections in the two states. In Maharashtra, the Mahayuti alliance of the BJP, Shiv Sena, and Nationalist Congress Party won 235 of the 288 assembly seats, with the BJP alone winning 132. Shinde's Sena, a constituent of the ruling Mahayuti alliance, won 57 of the 81 seats it contested.



CM Rio Opens New Amenities at Kisama for Hornbill Fest:-

Nagaland Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio has inaugurated different infrastructures to commemorate the 25th edition of the Hornbill Festival at Kisama, which begins on December 1. During the day, Rio unveiled the international morung, the Hornbill festival app, a dormitory for cultural troupes, a marketing complex for the handloom and artisan pavilion, a medical booth-cumcash vending facility, and the tourism department

lounge. He said the festival is no more a Naga festival and has rather become an international event attracting tourists from all over the globe.



Gujarat Launches Cottage and Rural Industries Policy 2024-29:-

The Gujarat government launched a new cottage and rural industries program, offering increased loans and incentives to artisans and entrepreneurs who establish businesses in the state. Balwantsinh Rajput, Minister of Cottage Industries, launched the program in Gandhinagar, claiming that it will help create approximately 12 lakh jobs over the next five years. The new policy was implemented after the former scheme's five-year validity period expired, according to an official release. Under the policy, the state will work towards the availability of credit and market support to artisans and focus on infrastructure, skill, technology upgrades and innovation, Rajput said.



UN nature conference ends without agreement on finance:-

The 16th UN biodiversity discussions in Cali, Colombia, were suspended on November 2nd due to a lack of consensus on the establishment of a new fund for environmental preservation. The summit, which lasted around 12 hours longer than planned, resulted in an important agreement to form a subsidiary body that will engage indigenous peoples in future biodiversity conservation talks and decisions. The participating countries also agreed to establish a new global fund dedicated to sharing the benefits of digitally-sequenced

genetic data taken from plants and animals with the communities they come from.



First Asian Buddhist Summit to be held in Delhi on November 5-6:-

The Ministry of Culture and the International Buddhist Confederation (IBC) will hold the first Asian Buddhist Summit (ABS) in New Delhi on November 5-6. The summit's topic is "Role of Buddha Dhamma in Strengthening Asia." The Hon'ble President of India is anticipated to attend the ceremony as Chief Guest. Through the summit, it shall bring together Sangha leaders, scholars, experts and practitioners from various Buddhist traditions across Asia to foster dialogue, promote understanding and address contemporary challenges faced by the Buddhist community.



ILO's 352nd Governing Body Meeting Being Held In Geneva:-

The International Labour Organization's (ILO) 352nd Governing Body meeting is taking place in Geneva, Switzerland, from October 28 to November 7, 2024. During the first week, Ms. Sumita Dawra, Secretary, Ministry of Labor and Employment, leads the India delegation. India praised the ILO during the October 30,

2024, discussion of the proposal for increased democratization within the ILO Governing Body, however, India also stated support for comprehensive governance reforms in other UN bodies in addition to the ILO.



Amit Shah Chairs 32nd Kendriya Hindi Samiti Meeting in New Delhi :-

Union Home Minister Amit Shah stated that a long-term program for the promotion, protection, and durability of Hindi literature and its diverse grammatical forms was required, according to a statement issued by the Union Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA). Mr. Shah was addressing at the 32nd conference of the Kendriya Hindi Samiti, the highest authority that sets criteria for the promotion and progressive usage of Hindi. The Samiti's role is to coordinate the work and programs implemented by various Ministries and departments of the government of India for the development and promotion of Hindi.



Hyderabad hosted annual cybersecurity summit to address growing cyber threats:-

The Hyderabad City Security Council (HCSC) held the H.A.C.K. (Hyderabad Annual Cybersecurity Knowledge)

Summit 2024 at the Park Hotel in Somajiguda. This event sought to bring together cybersecurity experts, government officials, and industry executives to address the urgent issue of cyber threats and explore ways for improving cybersecurity measures. The summit, hosted by the Hyderabad City Security Council (HCSC), had the Minister for IT and Industries, D. Sridhar Babu, as chief guest, along with other prominent industry and government figures.



Indian Military Heritage Festival 2024:-

The second edition of the annual Indian Military Heritage Festival (IMHF) took place in New Delhi from November 8 to 9, 2024. The two-day festival intended to bring together global and Indian think tanks, corporations, public and private sector initiatives, non-profits, academics, and research researchers interested in India's national security, foreign policy, military history, and heritage. Chief of Defence Staff Gen Anil Chauhan inaugurated the festival along with the three Service Chiefs. The inauguration of the festival also witnessed the launch of Project 'Shaurya Gatha'.



Mentoring Summit India 2024 to be launched in Bengaluru:-

Mentoring Summit India 2024, a two-day event for mentoring practitioners in India, will be held in the city on November 13 and 14 at the Bangalore International Centre (BIC). The conference, hosted to commemorate the 15th anniversary of Mentor Together, a Bengalurubased organization that focuses on formal youth mentoring in India, is sponsored by LinkedIn, the British Asian Trust, BT Group, the Brookings Centre for Universal Education, and the Agency Fund. Some key themes that will be addressed include mentoring and educational policy, designing quality mentoring programmes, decoding the global evidence around youth mentoring, innovations in mentoring etc.



55th International Film Festival of India:-

The 55th International Film Festival of India (IFFI), which will take place in Goa from November 20 to 28, is setting up to be a cinematic extravaganza. With the theme 'Young Filmmakers - The Future is Now,' IFFI 2024 pledges to highlight the best emerging voices in film while also honoring Indian cinema's past. The Festival Director, legendary filmmaker Shekhar Kapur, revealed key elements of this year's event at a curtain-raising event at the National Media Centre (NMC) in New Delhi. The festival will feature a dazzling line-up of over 180 films from 81 countries.



5th National EMRS Fest Celebrates Tribal Heritage & Birsa Munda's Legacy:-

The National Education Society for Tribal Students (NESTS) is holding the 5th National EMRS Cultural & Literary Fest and Kala Utsav in 2024. The Odisha Model Tribal Educational Society (OMTES) will organize the major event from November 12th to 15th, 2024, at Shiksha 'O' Anusandhan at Khandagiri, Bhubaneswar, Odisha. This year's the theme of cultural fests is, "A Tribute to Bhagwan Birsa Munda & Tribal Freedom Fighters," and it adds historical and cultural significance to the occasion, aligning with the birth anniversary of Bhagwan Birsa Munda.



PM Modi to attend G20 Summit in Brazil, visit Nigeria and Guyana:-

Prime Minister Narendra Modi will embark on a three-nation journey from November 16 to 21, visiting Nigeria, Brazil, and Guyana to improve bilateral and multilateral ties. This tour will be historic, as PM Modi will be the first Indian Prime Minister to visit Nigeria in 17 years, and the first to conduct a state visit to Guyana since 1968. At the invitation of Nigerian President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, PM Modi will visit Nigeria from November 16-17, engaging in high-level talks to advance the strategic partnership established in 2007 between the two nations.



Piyush Goyal launches 43rd India International Trade Fair in New Delhi :-

The 43rd India International Trade Fair (IITF) has started at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi. Union Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal launched the 14-day event. The theme for this year's fair is Viksit Bharat @ 2047. This year's focus state is Jharkhand, and the partner states are Bihar and Uttar Pradesh. This year, 11 countries, including China, Egypt, Iran, South Korea, Thailand, Turkey, and the UAE, are taking part in this international event. The first five days of the fair till 18th November, will be open for business trade. Thereafter, it will be open to the general public till the 27th of November.



India Hosting Global Conference Of Cooperatives For The First Time :-

On November 25, at Bharat Mandapam in the nation's capital, Prime Minister Narendra Modi officially opened the UN International Year of Cooperatives 2025 and the ICA Global Cooperative Conference 2024. Representatives from more than 100 nations will be present at the event. 

Development of Tuna Cluster in Andaman and Nicobar Islands



Why in the News?

The Department of Fisheries has notified the creation of a Tuna Cluster in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands as part of the Pradhan Mantri ADEM • Matsya Sampada Yojana (PMMSY).

- With an Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) of almost 6.0 lakh square kilometres, the A&N Islands have substantial prospects for the development of fisheries.
- With a potential of 60,000 metric tonnes, this area boasts abundant marine resources, especially tuna and tuna-like species.
- The islands' proximity to Southeast Asia facilitates effective air and sea travel, while the clear waters encourage sustainable fishing.

About Tuna Species and its Significance

- Large, swift swimmers, tuna are members of the Thunnini tribe in the Scombridae family.
- Tropical and temperate oceans around the world are home to tuna, which are distinguished by their sleek bodies and exceptional agility.
- Among the more than 15 species of tuna, the Bluefin, Yellowfin, Albacore, Bigeye, and Skipjack are among the most popular.

- Tuna species like Bluefin can weigh over 450 kg and can develop rapidly. They can also survive for several decades.
- Its flavour, texture, and nutritional content make it one of the most sought-after and lucrative fish in the world's seafood market.
- Particularly valued species include bluefin tuna, which frequently commands high prices in markets, particularly in Japan for sushi and sashimi dishes.
- It is high in omega-3 fatty acids, which promote heart health, brain function, and inflammation reduction; it is also low in saturated fat and high in protein.
- Iron, vitamin B12, vitamin D, and selenium are among the vital vitamins and minerals it offers.

Asia Tea Alliance not in favor of GM Tea



Why in the News?

- As climate change impacts the world's tea industry, the Asia Tea Alliance (ATA) decided to oppose genetically modified (GM) tea.
- Some businesses have pushed for genetically modified tea since climate change has caused India's tea production to drop by 10% this year.

 After China, India is the world's fourthlargest exporter of tea and the world's second-largest producer of black tea.

What is Asia Tea Alliance (ATA)?

- Founded: April 19, 2019, in Guizhou, China.
- **5 Members**: India, China, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, and Japan.
- Goals: Enhance tea trade, cultural exchange, and globally promote tea.

About Indian Tea Industry:

- With 18% of the world's total tea consumption, India is the biggest consumer of black tea.
- 1.16 million people are directly employed by the Indian tea industry, and an equivalent number are indirectly employed.
- It is controlled by the Union Government through an Act of Parliament and overseen by the Tea Board of India.Geographical conditions:
 - The Nilgiris in south India, north Bengal (including Darjeeling, Terai, and the Dooars), and northeast India (including Assam).
 - Tea is best grown in tropical and subtropical climates, which are primarily found in Asia, Africa, and South America.
 - At least five hours of sunlight each day and cool to mild temperatures (15–23°C) are necessary, as is 150– 200 cm of annual rainfall.
 - The first tea to be GI-tagged in 2004–
 05 was Darjeeling Tea, dubbed the
 "Champagne of teas" due to its scent.

RBI released list of Domestic Systemically Important Banks (D-SIBs)



Why in the News?

The RBI designated SBI, HDFC Bank, and ICICI Bank as Domestic Systemically Important Banks (D-SIBs) for 2024.

Current D-SIBs in India:

- State Bank of India (SBI), HDFC Bank, and ICICI Bank are categorised as D-SIBs as of 2024.
- In 2015, SBI was designated as a D-SIB; in 2016, ICICI Bank; and in 2017, HDFC Bank.

What are Domestic Systemically Important Banks (D-SIBs)?

- The stability of a nation's financial system depends on D-SIB banks.
- Their failure might create major economic disruptions, which is why they are frequently referred to as "Too Big To Fail" (TBTF).
- Every year, the RBI identifies D-SIBs.
- In July 2014, the methodology for identifying these banks was released.
- Since 2015, the RBI has released an annual list of D-SIBs.

D-SIBs are placed in different buckets based on systemic importance scores. Higher bucket rankings require greater capital requirements to absorb losses.

- SBI is in Bucket 4.
- HDFC Bank is in Bucket 3.
- ICICI Bank is in Bucket 1.

D-SIBs must maintain additional Common Equity Tier 1 (CET1) capital based on their bucket.

- SBI: 0.80% of Risk Weighted Assets (RWAs).
- HDFC Bank: 0.40%
- ICICI Bank: 0.20%

Global Systemically Important Banks (G-SIBs):

- The Financial Stability Board (FSB) designates G-SIBs on the international scene.
- G-SIBs include major global banks like HSBC and JP Morgan Chase.
- G-SIB-eligible foreign banks must maintain additional CET1 capital in India in proportion to their global risk-weighted assets.

Benefits of D-SIB Classification

- By demanding extra capital buffers for resilience during economic hardship, it guarantees financial stability.
- By improving oversight and regulation, it boosts public trust.
- Better governance and controls result from the increased supervisory attention it receives.
- It frequently gains from improved access to money, reduced borrowing rates, and stronger credit ratings.

India's first modern Compressed Biogas (CBG) Plant



Why in the News?

PM Modi inaugurated the 100 TPD cattle dungbased Compressed Bio-Gas (CBG) plant in Gwalior.

About the CBG Plant

- The facility is situated in Adarsh Gaushala, the biggest cowshed in the area, which has over 10,000 cattle, in Laltipara, Gwalior.
- It covers more than five acres.

- It is the first self-sufficient gaushala in India with a state-of-the-art CBG plant that turns organic waste (including vegetable and fruit waste from homes and mandis) and cow manure into useful biogas.
- The Indian Oil Corporation and the Gwalior Municipal Corporation collaborated to build the project, which came with a ₹31 crore price tag.

Working features:

- Bio CNG: A cleaner, more environmentally friendly substitute for conventional fossil fuels, the plant generates 2 tonnes of compressed Bio CNG per day from 100 tonnes of cattle dung.
- Organic Manure: A important by-product for organic farming, the plant also produces 10 to 15 tonnes of dry bio-manure every day.
- Windrow composting: To improve the processing of organic waste, the factory has windrow composting, which is next to the main building.

- Storage and Distribution: For a variety of uses, it is carried to gasoline stations or industry in high-pressure tanks or cylinders.

Significance of CBG

- Lessens reliance on fossil fuels.
- Reduces methane emissions from landfills.
- By substituting CBG for CNG, pollution can be decreased.
- Makes use of organic waste from the area.

Japan's iconic Mount Fuji has set a new record for the longest delay in snowfall since records began in 1894.

Why delay in snowfall at Mount Fuji?

- Higher Temperatures: The cooling required for snow has been postponed due to Japan's warmest summer on record and abovenormal October temperatures.
- Heatwave: Even into September, Japan saw a number of "extremely hot" days with highs of over 35°C.
- Snow production was further hampered by a northerly change in the subtropical jet stream, which delivered warmer air over Japan.

Project to monitor animal health launched



Why in the News?

The Union Minister of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry, and Dairying launched the 'Animal Health Security Strengthening in India for Pandemic Preparedness and Response' initiative in New Delhi.

What is the primary aim of the Animal Health Security Project?

Through improved monitoring, laboratory systems, and regional cooperation, the Animal Health Security Project seeks to increase India's ability to prevent, identify, and address threats to animal health while lowering the risk of zoonotic diseases.

What are the objectives of the Animal Health Security Project?

- Prevention, Detection, and Response: Reduce the likelihood that infections will spread from animals to people by strengthening India's capacity to prevent, identify, and address hazards to animal health.
- Boost Surveillance Systems: To quickly detect any dangers, enhance and combine

- early warning and surveillance systems for animal diseases.
- Infrastructure for Labs and Vaccines: To guarantee readiness, modernise and grow lab networks and vaccine production plants.
- Data Systems and Analytics: To facilitate risk communication and well-informed decisionmaking, enhance interoperable data systems and analytics capabilities.
- Cross-Border Cooperation: Through crossborder cooperation, encourage regional cooperation for the control of transboundary animal diseases.

How is the project funded and what is its timeline?

- The Pandemic Fund, which was created by the G20 nations to assist low- and middleincome nations in strengthening their pandemic preparedness, is providing funding for the initiative.
- India's idea was awarded a \$25 million grant, and the fund raised \$2 billion in its first round.
- The Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO), the World Bank, and the Asian Development Bank (ADB) will carry out the project.
- Timeline: August 2026 is the anticipated completion date.

Why is this project necessary for India?

- Threat of Zoonotic Diseases: Approximately two-thirds of infectious diseases that affect people are zoonotic, or spread by animals; COVID-19 is one recent example. India is susceptible to zoonotic diseases due to its sizable population of 536 million livestock.
- Impact on Public Health: The project is essential for India's pandemic prevention and public health security, as five of the six

- main worldwide public health emergencies in recent decades have been zoonotic.
- Protection of Vulnerable groups: The project intends to safeguard the livelihoods, nutritional security, and general well-being of vulnerable groups that depend on livestock by tackling animal health problems.

Way forward:

- Boost Sector-to-Sector Coordination: To develop an integrated response to zoonotic hazards, strengthen cooperation amongst the environmental, public health, and animal health sectors, guaranteeing prompt data exchange and response systems.
- Maintain Infrastructure and Capacity Building Investments: After the project is over, make sure that funds are kept up for training, vaccine development, and laboratory networks in order to stay ready and strengthen resistance to new animal-tohuman illnesses.

Savannah Elephant populations fell by about 70% on average



Why in the News?

Savanna elephants have experienced a significant population decline of around 70% across surveyed sites, primarily due to poaching and habitat loss.

Decline in African Elephants Population

 Researchers used data from 475 sites across 37 nations between 1964 and 2016 to provide a thorough evaluation of these species.

- Savanna Elephants: At the sites surveyed, populations decreased by an average of almost 70%.
- Forest Elephants: At surveyed sites, populations decreased by an average of almost 90%.
- At surveyed areas, the average number of African elephants declined by 77%.

Features of African Elephants:

- The largest land mammal on the planet, African elephants are distinguished by their size, intelligence, and intricate social structures.
- African elephants are classified as either forest elephants (smaller, with straighter tusks and dense forest habitats) or savanna (bush) elephants (larger, with bigger tusks and open grassland environment).
- African elephants are extremely intelligent animals that exhibit memory, empathy, and complex social relationships within their herds.



Geographical Spread

- Savanna Elephants: Found mostly in grasslands and savannas in eastern and southern Africa, these elephants are highly prevalent in Botswana, Zimbabwe, and Tanzania.
- Forest Elephants: Found primarily in Gabon, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and portions of Cameroon, these animals live in the tropical forests of central and western Africa.

Article 6.4 of the Carbon Market



Why in the News?

- Global carbon trading under UN oversight has been made possible by the passage of Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement at the COP29 climate summit in Baku, Azerbaijan.
- UN member nations can now exchange carbon credits internationally thanks to this recent development.

What is Article 6.4?

- The Paris Agreement's Article 6.4 creates a worldwide carbon market to make it easier for nations to trade carbon credits.
- It is included in Article 6, which describes procedures for global collaboration in the pursuit of net-zero emissions.
- Goal: Make it possible for nations to invest in emission reduction initiatives in other nations in order to offset their own emissions.
- It creates a worldwide carbon market that is supervised by a UNFCCC Supervisory Body.
- This organisation would create regulations, oversee the granting of loans, and guarantee adherence to global norms.

- Emission Reduction Credits (ERCs), which reflect decreases in CO2 or comparable greenhouse gases, can be created and traded by nations.
- Credits can be exchanged internationally and are obtained from authorised climate programs.
- Countries can use ITMOs (Internationally Transferred Mitigation Outcomes), which are tradeable units that represent emissions reductions, to achieve their NDCs through subsections such as Article 6.2.

Significance of Article 6.4

- Cost-Effective Climate Action: Article 6.4
 offers a cost-effective way to reduce
 emissions by facilitating global carbon
 markets, which may save an estimated \$250
 billion a year in climate plan
 implementation.
- Support for NDCs: By giving nations more flexibility and encouraging global investments in green initiatives, the mechanism assists them in meeting their NDC targets under the Paris Agreement.
- Economic Growth and Climate Mitigation: Carbon markets encourage renewable energy investments, generate employment in climate-related fields, and connect climate action with economic growth.
- Promotes Sustainable Development: By encouraging the transfer of green technologies and bolstering local economies, Article 6.4 provides incentives for sustainable projects in developing nations.

ADB increases Climate Finance backed by US, Japan Pledge



Why in the News?

- The United States and Japan have agreed to offer risk assurances for some existing loans, which will increase climate-related funding by up to \$7.2 billion through the Asian Development Bank (ADB).
- Sovereign guarantees are being used for climate funding for the first time.

Why in the News?


- The widespread usage of western honey bees to increase pollination has had unexpected ecological effects.
- They now unintentionally bring and spread the Thai Sacbrood Virus to hives of native bees.

About Western Honey Bees

- Apis mellifera is its scientific name.
- introduced all over the world for their capacity to produce honey and pollinate.
 They were brought to India in 1983 in an effort to increase honey production.
- extensively utilised in agriculture, especially for pollinating crops, vegetables, and fruit trees.

Thai Sacbrood Virus Outbreak

- Honey bee numbers have been negatively damaged by the Thai Sacbrood Virus (TSBV) outbreak in China and Vietnam.
- About 90% of Asiatic honey bee colonies in South India were destroyed by a Thai sacbrood virus outbreak in 1991–1992, and it reappeared in Telangana in 2021.
- The virus mostly affects honey bee larvae, which is why their mortality rates are so high.
- Consequently, bee colonies in the impacted areas saw sharp drops, which had an impact on pollination services and honey production.
- The virus has spread more easily as a result of bee colonies moving for commercial pollination and honey production.



About Indian Bees and Their Habitat

- The majority of Indian bees are Asian honey bees, specifically Apis cerana indica.
- They can be found in a variety of settings, such as urban areas, woodlands, and agricultural areas.
- They do well in places with lots of flowers and nectar.
- Indian bees sustain biodiversity and food production in the ecosystem and are crucial for pollination, particularly for native plants.
- The use of pesticides, habitat degradation, and competition from Western Honey Bees, which could outcompete them for food and nesting locations, are some of the problems they face.

Significance of Honey Bee:

- Pollination and Food Security: Honey bees are essential for pollinating crops, which helps produce fruits, vegetables, and nuts and ensures agricultural sustainability and global food security.
- Biodiversity Conservation: By aiding in plant reproduction, honey bees promote biodiversity and ecosystem health, preserving the harmony of natural environments and boosting ecosystem resilience.

Jagannath Puri Temple



Why in the News?

Odisha's law minister recently clarified that there was no secret chamber inside the treasury of the Jagannath Temple in Puri.

About Jagannath Puri Temple

- Located in Puri, Odisha, the Jagannath shrine is a significant Vaishnavite shrine devoted to Jagannath, a manifestation of Sri Krishna.
- Anantavarman Chodaganga Deva, the first ruler of the Eastern Ganga dynasty, started the reconstruction of the current temple in the tenth century on the location of an earlier temple.
- The three main deities are hauled on enormous, ornately decorated temple chariots during the Puri temple's yearly Ratha Yatra, or chariot festival, which makes it famous.

It's Architecture:

- It is among the most spectacular monuments in India because of the richness of its sculpture and the fluidity of the Oriya style of temple design.
- The massive temple complex is encircled by a tall defensive wall and spans more than 400,000 square feet.
- Meghanada Pacheri is the name of this wall, which is 20 feet high.
- The main temple is surrounded by another wall called Kurma Bedha.

The temple has four distinct sectional structures, namely:

- Deula, Vimana or Garba griha (Sanctum sanctorum) where the triad deities are lodged on the ratnavedi (Throne of Pearls). In Rekha Deula style;
- 2. Mukhashala (Frontal porch);

- 3. Nata mandir/Natamandapa, which is also known as the Jagamohan (Audience Hall/Dancing Hall), and
- 4. Bhoga Mandapa (Offerings Hall)

Janjatiya Gaurav Divas



Why in the News?

- November 15th has been observed as Janjatiya Gaurav Divas since 2021 in remembrance of the roles played by tribal communities in the fight for Indian independence.
- The renowned Sri Birsa Munda's birth anniversary is celebrated on this day.

Who was Birsa Munda?

- Born on November 15, 1875, in the Chotanagpur area (present-day Jharkhand), at a time when the Munda community was undergoing major transformation.
- His early years were spent travelling with his parents, and Jaipal Nag taught him primary school.
- Birsa became a pioneer in support of tribal rights after being impacted by the Sardari agitation, a nonviolent protest against British control.

Causes of the Rebellion:

 Tribal populations were uprooted and exploited as a result of British policies such

- as the Permanent Settlement Act (1793), which upset traditional land patterns.
- Jagirdars and thikadars undermined the Mundas' khuntkatti land rights system, which led to land alienation.
- Under British authority, a rise in non-tribal migration resulted in forced labour and high-interest money lending, which led to exploitation.
- Tribals were more conscious as a result of missionary-led education, which sparked social divisions as well as struggles for tribal rights.

Historical Background:

 In an effort to stop Christian missionaries from converting indigenous people, Birsa

- founded the Birsait faith. It made British conversion efforts more difficult.
- The Birsait sect attracted members from the Munda and Oraon communities.
- He was revered by the Mundas as the "Father of the Earth," or Dharati Aaba.
- Birsa Munda led the Ulgulan Movement, also referred to as the Munda Rebellion, from 1899 to 1900.
- focused on the Khunti, Tamar, Sarwada, and Bandgaon areas of the Munda belt.
- The objective, referred to as Ulgulan or the "Great Tumult," was to create independence and Munda Raj, or self-rule.
- Birsa Munda was captured and killed as British forces put an end to the uprising.

Why in the News?

According to a joint report by the UN and the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD), at least 65 million people are food insecure in the Horn of Africa.

Food Insecurity in Horn of Africa Region:

Of the 65 million affected, 36 million reside in IGAD member states: Djibouti, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, South Sudan, Sudan, and Uganda.

Main Causes:

- The main causes of food insecurity are extreme weather and climate change, which create dire circumstances.
- The situation has gotten worse due to the destruction of infrastructure, food supplies, and revenue streams caused by conflict.

Geopolitical and strategic importance for India:

- The Middle East, which is essential to the world's oil production, is close to the Horn of Africa.
- The Red Sea shipping lanes next to the Horn carry about 40% of the Middle Eastern oil, making it a vital location for energy security.
- The Bab el Mandeb Strait, one of the busiest maritime chokepoints in the world, connects the Red Sea to the Gulf of Aden and is controlled by Djibouti and the neighbouring regions.
- To protect their interests in this vital area, a number of nations, including the US, France,

- and China, have built military installations in Djibouti.
- China's "string of pearls" strategy, which seeks to establish economic and military bases around India, is consistent with its presence in Djibouti and other Horn of Africa countries.
- For Indian investments in the mining, energy, and infrastructure sectors, the Horn region acts as a gateway to Africa.
- Terrorist organisations like Al-Shabaab and pirates are hazards to the region, especially Somalia.

Indian Ocean Dialogue (IOD)



Why in the News?

India and the US held the first US-India Indian Ocean Dialogue on November 14 strengthening cooperation over the Indian Ocean Region (IOR).

About the Indian Ocean Dialogue:

- One of the main projects of the Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA) is the Indian Ocean Dialogue (IOD), which was created at the 13th Council of Ministers' meeting in November 2013 in Perth, Australia.
- It is a Track 1.5 debate that brings together officials and non-officials for a more inclusive conversation. The most recent

edition, which took place in Zanzibar, Tanzania, in May 2023, is the ninth.

- Key areas discussed in 2024 Edition:
 - Strengthening marine Security: Improves cooperation on marine security and freedom, which is essential for energy supplies and commercial routes.
 - Economic and Environmental Cooperation: Addresses the effects of climate change on the area and promotes trade and the blue economy.

Significance in India-U.S. Relations

- The Indo-Pacific Partnership combines the strategic objectives of both countries and strengthens quad cooperation.
- The region's power balance promotes an open Indo-Pacific by balancing out the influence of other states.
- Collaboration in Defence and Technology: Strengthens India's security role by fostering new connections in defence and emerging technology.
- Disaster preparedness strengthens efforts at sustainable resource management and climate resilience.

What is the Student Direct Stream visa?



Why in the News?

Canada has discontinued the Student Direct Stream (SDS), ending faster processing for students from specific countries, including India.

What is the Student Direct Stream (SDS) Visa?

- Canada launched the SDS, a fast-track visa processing program, in 2018 to help students from specific nations—including India—get study permits more quickly.
- The average processing time for applications under SDS was about 20 days.
- By demanding certain school records and evidence of financial stability (such as a Guaranteed Investment Certificate), this stream was created to streamline and expedite the application process for qualified candidates.
- Students from 14 nations, including Trinidad and Tobago, China, India, Pakistan, and Vietnam, were subject to the SDS.
- With a high acceptance rate for study permits in previous years, SDS has been well-liked by Indian students since its inception.

Why was SDS discontinued?

- Fair Access: The goal of switching to a single, standardised procedure is to provide every candidate an equal chance.
- Strengthened Protection: As part of its routine procedure, Canada plans to strengthen protections in order to alleviate student vulnerability.
- The modifications are a part of Canada's larger immigration reforms, which also include updated study permit caps and financial criteria.

How does the discontinuation affect Indian Students?

Indian students will face:

- Extended Processing Times: Under the current standard procedure, visa approvals may now take longer.
- Additional Financial Proof: Additional financial records will be needed.
- Changes to the Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP): Effective November 1, 2024, new regulations may affect post-graduation employment opportunities.

Does the Sun rotate?



Why in the News?

Indian astronomers at the Kodaikanal Solar Observatory (KSO) have achieved a groundbreaking feat by mapping, for the first time, the variation in the Sun's rotation speed from its equator to its poles.

Sun's Rotation: Key Facts

- The Sun has differential rotation, which means that its various components rotate at different speeds in contrast to a solid body.
- Latitude affects rotation speed, with slower rotation towards the poles and faster rotation close to the equator.
- The Sun's composition of gaseous plasma rather than solid substance is the main cause of this variation.

Rotation Period Variation by Latitude:

- Equatorial Regions: Sidereal revolution at the equator takes about 24.47 days, making it the quickest rotation time.
- Approximately 16 degrees latitude is the sunspot zone. With a duration of roughly 27.3 days, rotation slows down a little.
- Rotation slows considerably at higher latitudes (up to 75 degrees); for instance, the rotation period is roughly 33.4 days at 75 degrees latitude.
- Poles: With a period of about 31.1 days, the poles rotate the slowest.

Sidereal vs. Synodic Rotation Periods:

- The time it takes for the Sun to complete one full rotation in relation to far-off stars is known as the sidereal rotation period. At the equator, it lasts 24.47 days, but at higher latitudes, it lasts approximately 33.4 days.
- The time it takes for a fixed feature on the Sun to appear in the same location when viewed from Earth is known as the synodic rotation period. Because of Earth's own orbit around the Sun, it lasts longer than the sidereal period, averaging about 26.24 days.

Why Differential Rotation Occur?


- Composition of Gaseous Plasma: The Sun's various regions rotate at different speeds because of the heated, ionised state of matter that makes up its plasma.
- Convective Zone Dynamics: Differential rotation is influenced by the Sun's outer

convective layer. At different latitudes, the spinning speed is affected by the rising and falling plasma.

Scientific Implications

- Solar Dynamo Theory: Theories about the solar dynamo, which produces the magnetic field of the Sun, are based on the Sun's differential spin.
- Mystery of Differential Rotation: The precise process underlying the Sun's differential rotation is still being studied in solar physics, despite a great deal of research.

Europe's Proba-3 Mission arrived in India

- Increased thirst, frequent urination, exhaustion, and blurred vision are some of the symptoms.
- A balanced diet, consistent exercise, and weight control are all part of the treatment.
- Blood sugar levels can be controlled using medications like Metformin, and insulin therapy may be necessary in certain situations.
